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**ARRESTED.**

**Married His Stepdaughter.**

A Very Queer Condition of Affairs Developed in a Cincinnati Family.

Mrs. Josephine McClymond last week, had her husband arrested for bigamy in marrying his stepdaughter. The story she told is a very sensational one. They were married eight years ago she having a child by her first husband then only 9 years old. Four years ago when her daughter Lizzie was 13, her husband began paying undue attention to her. The girl became infatuated with him and within the past year their attachment was open and avowed. In May McClymond told his wife that he meant to marry Lizzie and he did so June 22. He told his wife that he was already married when he wedded her, which it seems is true, his first wife dying some time after he married his second choice. He declared as his second marriage was illegal he had a right to marry Lizzie.

The couple were married and the daughter took the place of the head of the household, occupying a room adjoining to that of her mother, whom she treated with scorn and harshness. The mother stood it for five months but today her patience was exhausted and she swore out the warrant. McClymond is the son of a well known attorney and no one outside of the three people involved suspected his dual relations, as his last marriage was at another city.
