

The Popularity of Silver.

Some of the Northern journals are endeavoring to create the impression that the masses of the people are indifferent to silver legislation and do not give the subject sufficient attention to be even fairly posted as to the merits of the discussion going on in Congress. It is contended that the agitation for free coinage is limited solely to a few Western owners of silver mines, and to members of Congress who favor it for partisan ends.

Of course it is natural for New York journals to disapprove and belittle what Wall street deems prejudicial to its interests in the hope that the cheaper metal may be kept in the background so that Eastern capitalists and money lenders may continue to exort high rates of interests on loans.

There is to-day outside of Wall street not a business man of any prominence who has failed to note the fact that in spite of the dire predictions made as to the disastrous effects to be expected from so liberal a coinage of silver, the free supply of the white metal has been so absorbed by the country that there is now an urgent demand for further expansion of our currency system. That the success with which the country has absorbed the amount of silver purchased under the old act should have encouraged the people to demand an even freer use of silver is not surprising, as in that direction only was there hope of permanent relief from the monetary stringency that has prevailed for some years back.

That there is a general demand for free coinage, growing out of the necessity of further expanding our currency, is un doubted, and that the people fully understand the issue and all that is involved in free coinage is undoubtedly true, the Eastern press to the contrary notwithstanding.—Picyaune.
