

Police Jury.

Meetings of the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Martin now constituted under the law as a Board of Reviewers for aforesaid Parish, July 8th 1890.

At 9 o'clock a. m., the Board was called to order; Were present Hon. E. A. Duchamp, President and Messrs. Gutekunst, Savoy and St. Germain; Absent Mr. Auguste Ledoux.

The minutes of yesterday's meeting were read and approved.

The Lists of Assessment were laid before the Board by the assessor. The Lists of the 4th Ward were taken up and examined until 1 o'clock p. m., at which time the Board took a recess of one hour.

At 2 o'clock p. m., the Board met and took up work until 5 o'clock p. m., at which time the Board adjourned to tomorrow 9th instant at 9 o'clock a. m.

Wednesday July 9th 1890.

The Board met at 9 o'clock a. m. Absent Mr. Auguste Ledoux.

Work was taken up examining Lists of 4th Ward. At 1 o'clock p. m., a recess was taken until 2 o'clock p. m.

At 2 o'clock p. m., the Board was called to order. The Lists of 4th Ward were taken up and examined until 4 1/2 o'clock p. m., at which time the Board adjourned to tomorrow 10th inst at 9 o'clock a. m., having completed the 4th Ward and taken up the 1st Ward.

Thursday July 10th 1890.

At 9 o'clock a. m., the Board was called to order. The roll was called.

Absent Mr. Auguste Ledoux. The Clerk was dispensed reading minutes of previous meetings.

There being no Police Jury business to transact, the work on Lists of Assessment for 1st and 3d Wards was taken up and continued until 1 o'clock p. m., when a recess was taken until 2 o'clock p. m.

At 2 o'clock p. m., the Board is called to order. The Lists of 1st and 3d Wards were again taken up and examined until 4 o'clock p. m., at which time the Board adjourned to next morning at 9 o'clock a. m.,

Friday July 11th 1890.

At 9 o'clock a. m., the Board was called to order. The roll was called; Absent Mr. Auguste Ledoux.

The action on the vacancy of cattle, postponed to this day on Monday last was again postponed and laid on the table to be acted upon in proper time.

Lists of Assessment 1st and 3d Wards were taken up and examined until 1 o'clock p. m. At this time a recess was taken until 2 o'clock p. m.

At 2 o'clock p. m., the meeting was again called to order. The Lists aforesaid were taken up and examined until 4 o'clock p. m., at which time the Board adjourned to Monday next July 14th at 9 o'clock a. m.

Monday July 14th 1890.

The meeting was called to order at 9 o'clock a. m.; Absent Messrs. Gutekunst and Ledoux.

Lists of 1st and 3d Wards taken up again, examined and completed. Lists of 5th Ward taken up and examined until 1 o'clock p. m. A recess was now taken until 2 1/2 o'clock p. m.

At 2 1/2 o'clock p. m., Board called to order. Lists of 5th Ward taken up again and examined until 4 1/2 o'clock p. m., at said time Board adjourned to next morning at 9 o'clock a. m.

Tuesday July 15th 1890.

The meeting was called to order at 9 o'clock a. m.

The roll is called. Absent; Messrs. Gutekunst and Ledoux Clerk dispensed reading the minutes.

The Lists of 5th Ward examined and completed. At 1 o'clock p. m., the Board took a recess until 2 1/2 o'clock p. m.

At 2 1/2 o'clock p. m., Board met again. The Assessor being unwell no work was made on the Lists of Assessment. The Board now adjourned to Monday the 21st at 9 o'clock a. m.

Monday July 21 1890.

The meeting is called to order at 9 o'clock a. m. Absent; Messrs. Gutekunst and Ledoux.

The Lists of the non-residents and Lists of the Corporation of Breauz Bridge were examined and both were completed.

The Board at 1 o'clock p. m. takes a recess until 2 1/2 o'clock p. m.

At 2 1/2 o'clock p. m., the work on Lists of non-residents was continued and Lists of the Corporation of St. Martinville was taken up. At 4 1/2 o'clock p. m. the Board adjourned to next day at 9 o'clock p. m.

Tuesday July 22 1890.

The meeting was called to order at 9 o'clock a. m. Absent Messrs. Gutekunst and Ledoux.

Reading of minutes dispensed with. Lists of the non-residents and of the Corporation of St. Martinville were again taken up and both were completed. A recess is taken until 2 1/2 o'clock p. m.

At 2 1/2 o'clock p. m., the Board met again. The Lists of Hon. Presidents of the Corporation of St. Martinville and Breauz Bridge were taken up and both were completed. The whole work being now completed, all the Assessment Lists were returned to the Assessor with instructions as to alterations and changes made.

The levying of the Parish Tax was, by reason of the absent of the Police Jurors representing the 2 and 5th Wards, postponed to next Regular Meeting.

There being no further business to transact, this meeting was adjourned.


