

AN ICE FACTORY.

We learn that last week a gentleman from Houma was here to interest some of our people in an ice factory, but we could not learn his plans or what was his success. We have, however, learned that a firm from Jennings would be here in a very few days to look up the situation with a view to at once erect an ice plant.

There was some talk last year of adding an ice plant to the Bailey ginners, but we have not heard about it lately.

We believe the opening here is a good for a factory, as this town has a population of about three thousand people, with a large surrounding country and a large number of small towns around that could be supplied from this plant.

If we look around us we will find that many smaller towns have successful ice plants, why should not St. Martinville make a success with a fifteen ton plant?

We are satisfied that a plant of this kind in the hands of the proper management would be a paying enterprise.

Sixth Parish Institute.

Last Saturday the Sixth Parish Institute were held at the St. Martinville and Breaux Bridge High Schools at the same time, the St. Martinville Institute was conducted by Prof. Foote and the Breaux Bridge Institute by Supt. Favrot. The teachers of the first and third wards attending at St. Martinville and the teachers of the fourth and fifth wards at Bridge Bridge.

Dr. Estopinal of New Orleans, assistant medical inspector of the State Board of Health attended and lectured as both institutes upon the proper school sanitation and hygiene.

The programs at both institutes were interesting and many other subjects referring to school matters were discussed by the teachers.

Fatal Shooting.

A Breaux Bridge special to The Picayune, dated Feb. 20th says: "A gruesome killing occurred to-night on the Southern Pacific barge Harlan, which is the headquarters for a large gang of men who are completing the Southern Pacific's Atchafalaya bridge. The unfortunate affair was the outcome of a dispute over the ownership of a mosquito bar between two of the men, Ed. Hodges, from Illinois, 27 years old, and August Smoker, a German, 41 years old.

Hodges fired three times at close range into Smoker's body with a 41-caliber pistol, causing instant death. Hodges was perfectly sober, and in his statement to your correspondent, very coolly given, he cannot account for the rash act, although he bears on his forehead a scalp wound, which he says must have been administered by the dead man.

Hodges was in a kneeling position when he realized what he had done. The co-laborers and the boss of the men state that both were unassuming and quiet and attentive to their duties. Hodges was given to the custody of Sheriff A. E. Broussard, who sent him to the Parish Jail at St. Martinville. Dr. de Lauroal, the coroner, arrived on the scene at 1 o'clock this morning and impaued a jury to hold the inquest.
