Difficulties of the Plant.

The management of the Light and Water plant are compelled from the First day of November, to run the light until mid-night and from five o'clock to a quarter past six o'clock, in order to save some fuel.

The plant at the present time, due to the high cost of fuel is running at a heavy loss, which cannot continue longer.

To be exact, we may say that the running expense of the plant per month is \$729.12 and the revenues from light and water is only \$460.00 leaving a deficit every month of \$269.12 of this the town is paying \$125.00 for its light and water, leaving a net loss to the town of \$144.12, which the management is trying to save in closing the lights at midnight.

This plant is a great protection to the town as was shown in many cases when threatened with disastrous fires, and yet our people do not seem disposed to patronize it as they should, some cutting out their water because of a small advance in the price, others because it is a little higher than oil, etc., not looking into the great protection they are receiving from this plant.

This condition cannot continue, other fuel saving machinery will have to replace those now in use or the price of fuel has to come down considerably for this plant to be self-sustaining as it should be. It is unreasonable to expect the revenues of the town to go to the plant and the town be deprived of many other necessary improvements.

We hope that the people of the town will do all they can to help the management who are making an effort to keep this plant moving under present difficult conditions, when left without money, and to save on the price of coal, was compelled to buy several thousands dollars worth of coal.

The condition is serious and the management must have the assistance of the people.

Water and Light Plant.

St. Martinville, La., Oct. 15, 1912. The Board of Managers of the Water and Light Plant met this day at the Town Hall.

Hon. Albert Bienvenu, chairman and the following members present: Dr. J. S. Martin and Mr. J. H. Duchamp.

Due to the advanced cost of fuel and the fact that the lights have to be put on earlier in the evening in winter, the Plant is actually running at a heavy loss, and in view of this fact the management feels compelled in order to continue the service, to close the lights from midnight to 5 a. m., except Saturdays. And all patrons are hereby given notice that this rule will take effect November 1st, 1912, and remain in force until such a time as conditions may change.

The Board has adopted the following Water Meter Rates for any patron of the Plant desiring to use same.

Meter Rate to be 20 cts per 1000 gallons.

Minimum rate 75 cts. In no case where meter is used shall any monthly bill be rendered for less than 75 cts, meters to be furnished and installed at patron's cost.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned.


