7. Of securing the conversion of the scholars to the Lord Jesus Christ, and developing them for Christian service.

All Sunday School in the Parish are expected to send delegates and they will be entertained by the Sunday School workers of St. Martinville during their stay at the convention. Mr. Kelso is Chairman of the Committee on entertainment to whom all names of those desiring entertainment should be sent. An attractive program is being arranged and topics of interest and value to present day Sunday School work will be discussed by persons who have had training along the lines they speak. Let every Sunday School worker in the Parish who has the upbuilding of our Parish at heart make some special effort to attend the convention.
