To Transfer Patterns.
Modern Farming.
Any pattern cut from a style book, magazine, or newspaper may easily be made into a perforated pattern as follows: Pin a piece of waxed paper under the pattern, large enough to cover it, then trace the pattern on the sewing machine without any thread. Use a large needle to make the holes as large as possible. Separate the papers and the waxed paper is a very good perforated pattern.

For the transfer medium put an ounce of finely powdered ultra blue in a four ounce bottle and fill the bottle with gasoline. Before using shake well and pour as needed into a sauce dish or saucer. Apply it with a tight roll of cloth, either felt or some felted material. This roll is made by taking a strip of cloth five or six inches wide and as long as desired, rolling it into a tight roll and tying in the middle with string. After using the pattern wipe off with clean gasoline to keep from clogging the perforations.

CHARTER.

STATE OF LOUISIANA.

PARISH OF ST. MARTIN.

Know ye that on this 20th day of April A. D. 1914, before the undersigned Notary Public in and for the Parish of St. Martin, Louisiana, duly commissioned and qualified as such and in the presence of the undersigned lawful witnesses, appeared the persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, who declare that they organize themselves into a Corporation for the purposes hereinafter mentioned.

Its corporate name is "Patin Oil Company", domiciled at St. Martinville, St. Martin Parish, Louisiana, with Fifteen Thousand Dollars Capital Stock of Fifty Dollars per share which shall be issued for cash or in payment of oil leases, or other property as may be determined by the Board of Directors. It shall begin operations when fifty per cent of the stock shall have been subscribed and paid for.

It shall exist for twenty-five years and shall sue and be sued through its President. Its affairs shall be managed by a Board of Directors composed of five stockholders. The first Board shall be J. M. Olivier, President, F. E. Delahoussaye, Secretary and Treasurer, C. C. Martin, Vice-President and E. Guidroz and George Knight, who shall elect all Officers and adopt all necessary by-laws and do all things necessary to carry out the purposes of this Corporation. The object of this Corporation is mining for oil, gas and all kinds of minerals, and the production and marketing thereof, and for that purpose to erect and construct all necessary derricks, install machineries, and to build transportation and communication facilities and all other thing necessary therefor, and to buy, lease, sell, pledge and mortgage real estate and other property.

This charter may be amended, or this Corporation dissolved by a two-thirds vote of the capital stock at any regular meeting, upon a fifteen days previous notice in writing to each stockholders, whose liability under this charter are limited to unpaid balance of their stock.
