DIED.

Mr. Ignace Narcis Hebert died at the Jennings Sanitarium Monday, and was buried here Tuesday morning at eight o'clock from the Catholic Church. Mr. Hebert was a son of Mr. E. L. Hebert of St. Martinville and was aged 27 years. He was employed at Rayne, where he was kicked by a horse. His injury from the kick was such that it was necessary to take him to Jennings, where he died soon after.

Mr. William Millot died at his home in St. Martinville, at 2:15 o'clock in the afternoon, Tuesday, at the age of 60 years. He was buried from the Catholic Church at nine o'clock Wednesday morning.

Mr. Millot was preceded to the grave by his wife who died a few months ago. He leaves two daughters, Mrs. A. G. Broussard and Miss Cecile Millot.

Sheriff Louis Lacoste of Lafayette accidentally killed himself at his home Wednesday morning. His revolver which was on a small table fell and exploded, the ball striking him in the neck and passing through the brain, causing instant death. Mr. Lacoste was sheriff since 1904. He was 38 years of age.

TOWN COUNCIL.

Regular monthly meeting of the Mayor and Town Council held at the Town Hall at St. Martinville, La., this 9th day of July A. D. 1914.

Hon. Albert Bienvenu Mayor presiding and the following members present, Messrs. W. J. Bienvenu J. H. Duchamp, F. F. Fournet, A. C. Gauthier and R. J. Guirard.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The following ordinance was offered by Mr. J. H. Duchamp and seconded by Mr. W. J. Bienvenu.

AN ORDINANCE.

To abate public nuisances, and more especially to prohibit the sale of Liquors to minors, and women, or girls, whether in Saloons of contiguous apartments or buildings, and to regulate the manner of conducting the business of a restaurant when conducted in conjunction with, or adjacent to a Saloon, in the Town of St. Martinville, Louisiana, and to prohibit the entering of girls, women, and miners in any such building or buildings for the purpose of amusement or otherwise, and prescribing the penalty for any violation thereof.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Town Council of the Town of St. Martinville, La., in open session convened:

That hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or Corporation conducting a Barroom cabaret, coffee, cafe, beer saloon, or other place where spirituous, vinous or malt liquors, or intoxicating beverages are sold in the Town of St. Martinville, Louisiana, to sell or permit to be sold, or to give or permit to be given, any intoxicating Liquors to women, girls or minors, or to set apart in such places, or in any buildings contiguous thereto, any apartment where intoxicating Liquors are sold, or given, or permitted to be given to women, girls or minors, or to permit women, girls, or minors to enter or to drink, or dance or in anywise frolic in any such apartments.

Be it further resolved etc.
That hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or Corporation, conducting a restaurant, pool room, or other place of amusement or recreation, adjacent, or contiguous to a Saloon, or other place where intoxicating liquors are sold, given, or permit to be given any intoxicating or other liquors to any women, girl or minor, or to permit or allow any women, girl or minor to enter any such buildings or apartments.

Be it further resolved that hereafter it shall be unlawful for any women, girl or minor to enter into any such Saloon, or other place where intoxicating liquors are sold, or to enter any Restaurant, Pool Room, apartment, or other place of recreation contiguous to, or adjacent to any Saloon or other places where intoxicating liquors are sold or given, or to dance, eat or in anywise amuse themselves therein.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$5.00, nor more than \$25.00, and in default of payment thereof, to be incarcerated in the Municipal Jail for a term of not less than five nor more than than twenty-five days, in the discretion of the Mayor, or both at the discretion of the Mayor. This ordinance to take effect from and after its first publication.

Voting aye: J. H. Duchamp, W. J. Bienvenu, F. F. Fournet, A. C. Gauthier and R. J. Guirard. Voting nay: None.

Mr. Guthridge of the Southwestern Development Bureau, having impressed the Council with the necessity of erecting a Dipping Vat for the purpose of eradicating the Cattle Tick.

It was moved by Mr. J. H. Duchamp seconded by Mr. A. C. Gauthier and unanimously carried, that the Council appropriate \$75.00 or as much thereof as may be necessary to construct a Dipping Vat in the Town of St. Martinville, provided that some individual or individuals shall contribute a like amount toward the construction of said Vat.

Provided further that the title of said Vat shall be vested in the Town of St. Martinville, La., the Vat however to be

open for public use of the citizen of the Parish of St. Martin.

The Committee having made a report in detail as to the knowledge regarding Crude Oil burning engines of the Plants examined, and the amount expended.

Moved by Mr. Fournet seconded by Mr. Bienvenu and unanimously carried, that said report be and is hereby accepted and that the Committee be recommended to proceed in getting further information before the Council take further steps.

Mr. Harold Raymonds, Engineer, Architect proposition was submitted to the Council by the Secretary, the Council not being ready at this time to consider same, laid same on the table for later consideration.

The Contractor having reported to the Mayor that he had completed his work and requested that the Council inspect and accept his work.

Moved by Mr. Gauthier seconded by Mr. Fournet and unanimously carried, that the Council meet Thursday July 9th at 6 A. M., to inspect the Side-Walks and Curbings, to order the repairs or rebuilding of all work that will prove defective, before the entire work can be accepted.

Moved by Mr. Duchamp seconded by Mr. Bienvenu and unanimously carried, that the Secretary be and he is hereby authorized to borrow from any Bank or Banks \$2000.00 or as much thereof as may be needed, said notes to be countersigned by the Mayor and one member of the Council.

The following bills were approved and ordered paid, Albert Bienvenu \$36.20, Paul Dupoy 25 cents, L. J. Gardemal \$1.25, Duchamp Hardware Co \$48.16, Ludger Fuseller \$2.00, Laissez Bienvenu \$16.50, Bonin Gro. Co, 10 cents, T. L. Bienvenu \$6.00, New Iberia Foundry and Machine Shop \$34.50, Leonce Pelleirin \$6.00, Duchamp & Ducrest 90 cents, Oswald Durand 50 cents, J. J. Burdin & Bro. \$58.25.

There being no further business before the Council upon motion of Mr. Guirard seconded by Mr. Duchamp the meeting adjourned.
