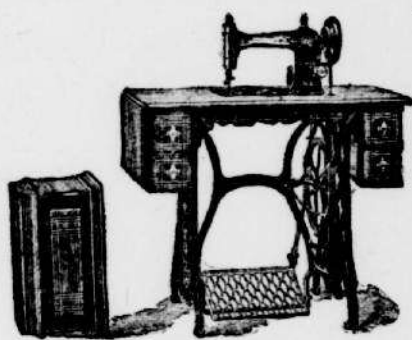

SOUTHWESTERN REFLECTIONS.

With Thanksgiving approaching, it is pertinent to inquire how many Southwest Louisiana farmers are prepared with fat three-dollar turkey cocks to meet the demands of local epicures and those of New Orleans, Houston and Beaumont? Suppose every farmer had even one hundred fat turkeys for sale now; he wouldn't have to give his cotton away for six cents a pound.

Suppose, in addition, every farmer had a half dozen litters of six-months old pigs, eight to the litter and each pig weighing 150 pounds. With corn and cow-peas and sweet potatoes and pumpkins ripe in the fields, another fifty pounds could be added within thirty days and there would be a year's supply of breakfast and side bacon, hams, sausage, lard and head cheese, besides a considerable surplus to bring in Christmas cash. Are you in on this? If not, do you consider yourself a real farmer?

Still we haven't mentioned beef and dairy cattle, which no real farm can be without, a small bunch of sheep, and a blooded colt or two. Do you consider that you have any right to complain about hard times, if you have neglected these elementary accessories of any institution that can lay reasonable claim to the dignity of a farm?

—Those who raise most of their living at home have a better living than those who must buy the ordinary necessities of life and there is more of the income left to buy those things that can not be raised on the farm. The first concern of the manager should be to produce food for the family, then feed for the stock, and last, but not least, crops and animals for a cash surplus above the living and the feed.
