TOWN COUNCIL.

An ordinance adopted by the Mayor and Town Council Nov. 19, 1914.

Corrections in the Ordinance adopted by the Mayor and Town Council, of the Town of St. Martinville, Louisiana, on the 6th day of November, 1914.

Whereas under the Sidewalks and curbing assessment adopted by the Mayor and Town Council, of the Town of St. Martinville, Louisiana, on the 6th day of November, 1914, errors were committed in the front foot measurement, of the hereinafter described properties, and accordingly also in the assessment against the respective properties, and the owners thereof, based on the entire costs of the said sidewalks and curbing for the respective streets.

Now, Be it Ordained by the Mayor and Town Council of the Town of St. Martinville, Louisiana, that due correction of said errors be and they are hereby made as follows, to-wit:

1st. The property of G. Fournet & Bro., situated in the Town of St. Martinville, Parish of St. Martin, bounded North by lot of Duchamp & Ducroet, South by Church Street, East by Main street, and West by lot of W. S. Thomas having a frontage of 42 feet and 9 inches on the sidewalks, on Main street, and erroneously stated in the said assessment ordinance of Nov. 6th, 1914, as having 138 feet and 11 inches on the Sidewalks on Church street, the true frontage on said Church street being 177 feet and 11 inches; therefore erroneous assessment of a \$191.88 levied as aforesaid is hereby cancelled and the correct sidewalk and curbing assessment of \$200.35 for the said frontage on said Main street and the said corrected frontage on the said Church street is levied and assessed against the said property and its owners payable as fixed in the aforesaid original ordinance.

2dly. The property of W. S. Thomas situated in the town of St. Martinville Louisiana, Parish of St. Martin, bounded North by property of Marcel J. Demahy, South by that of Duchamp & Ducroet, and Church street, East by Main street, and lots of Duchamp & Ducroet, and G. Fournet & Bro., and West by lot of Albert Durand; having a frontage of 63 feet and 4 inches on Main street, and erroneously stated in the assessment Ordinance of November 6th, 1914, as having a frontage of 63 feet and 7 inches on the sidewalks on Church street, and an assessment of \$143.55; the true frontage on the sidewalks on said Church street, being 24 feet and 7 inches; therefore the said erroneous assessment of \$143.55 is hereby cancelled, and the correct sidewalk and curbing assessment of \$115.38, based as aforesaid, is hereby levied and assessed against the said property and its owners payable as fixed in the aforesaid original ordinance.

3rdly. Lot owned by Charles Bienvenu, situated in the town of St. Martinville, Louisiana, Parish of St. Martin, bounded North by lot of Laizaire Bienvenu and Self, South by lot of M. J. Voorhies and Hamilton street, and East by lots of Mrs. Ruee Broussard and Carlos Bienvenu and West by lot of M. J. Voorhies and Main street, having a frontage of 62 feet on the sidewalk on Main street, and a frontage of 10 feet on the sidewalks on

Hamilton street; and having 6 feet 6 inch sewer pipes on Hamilton street, erroneously stated in the assessment ordinance of November 6th, 1914, as being assessed for the sum of \$57.30; the true assessment being \$75.30; therefore the said erroneous assessment of \$57.30 levied as aforesaid is hereby cancelled and the correct sidewalk and curbing assessment of \$75.30, based as aforesaid, is hereby levied and assessed against the said property and its owner, payable as fixed in the original ordinance.

4thly. Lot owned by Mrs. W. H. Livingston, situated in the Town of St. Martinville, Parish of St. Martin, La., bounded North by lot of Corporation of Martinville, South by Old Market, East by Bayou Teche, West by lot of Sisters of Mercy, erroneously stated in said assessment ordinance of November 6th, 1914, as having a frontage of 29 feet on the sidewalk on Port street, and an assessment of \$22.39; the true frontage on said street being 65 feet; therefore the said erroneous assessment of \$22.39, levied as aforesaid is hereby cancelled and the correct sidewalk and curbing assessment of \$40.18 for 65 feet based as aforesaid is hereby levied and assessed against the said property and its owner payable as fixed in the aforesaid original ordinance.

5thly. Lot owned by Joseph Remore situated in the town of St. Martinville, Parish of St. Martin Parish, La., bounded North by Clairborne street, South by lot of Harry Ponce, East by Main street, and West by lot of Robert Thomas, erroneously stated in the said ordinance of Nov. 6th, 1914, as having a frontage of 37 feet 5 inches on the sidewalks on Clairborne street, the said lot having a true frontage of 37 feet and 5 inches on the sidewalks on Main street and also having a true frontage of 148 feet 11 inches on the sidewalks on Clairborne street and having 6 feet 6 inches sewer pipe on Main street and 18 feet 6 inch and 12 1/2 feet 10 inch sewer pipe on Clairborne street; the error being merely in the published frontage of said lot on said streets, the original sidewalk and curbing assessment of \$143.09 being correct which said correct sidewalk and curbing assessment of \$143.09 is again levied and as originally done in the ordinance of Nov. 6th, 1914, and assessed against the said property or its owner, payable as fixed in the aforesaid original ordinance.
