

TO DESTROY RATS.

Take a 20-gallon wash pot and fill it one-half full with clear water; then put in enough cotton seed to make a cover on the water 1 1/2 inch thick; get some fresh meat, such as young chickens or blackbirds, and pull them to pieces in small bits and place on the seed; then put a slanting board with one end on the rim of the pot and the other on the floor or ground, as the case may be, so the rats can run up and down, they will jump on the seed to get the game and will drown. Put this in some place where cats or dogs can't get to it. It works like a clock.


