The Parish Democratic Executive Committee met here today pursuant to a call issued by Chairman Labbe.

The following resolution was then adopted by the committee:

Be it resolved, That in accordance with the requirements of Act No. 49 of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, for the year 1906, and amendments thereto, a Democratic Primary be and is hereby called to be held throughout the Parish of St. Martin on the 25th day of Jan. A. D. 1916 for the election of Democratic nominees to be voted upon at the General Election to be held at some future date.

Be it further Resolved, That the sum assessed against each of said candidates for the purpose of defraying the necessary expenses of said Primary Election in conformity with the Primary Law is hereby fixed as follows:

For the office of Sheriff.....\$25.00
For the office of Clerk of Court.....\$15.00
For the office of Assessor.....\$15.00
For the office of Representative.....\$ 5.00

The following resolution was then offered by Mr. Carl Larson proxy to L. C. Guidry and seconded by Mr. Lucien Lasseigne proxy to Albert Daspit and adopted:

Be it Resolved, That any person desiring to become a candidate in said Primary shall within ten days from the issuance of the call for said primary, that is, on or before Nov. 4, 1915, file with the Chairman of the Committee his written notification of his intention to become a candidate at said Primary, accompanied by a declaration, "That he is a duly qualified elector of this State and that he is a member of the Democratic Party."

Said application shall also be accompanied by the sum fixed and assessed by this Committee as hereabove specified.

Be it Resolved, That the meeting be now adjourned to meet again on Nov. 5, 1915 for the purpose of declaring candidates entitled to run or if unopposed to declare them the nominees of the party.

New Orleans Banker Expects High Sugar Prices

ELIMINATION OF TARIFF UNCERTAINTY REMOVES FEAR OF LOW MARKET.

New Orleans Item.

"Louisiana sugar planters have every reason to anticipate remunerative prices this fall," said a prominent New Orleans banker Wednesday morning in discussing conditions. "The indicated elimination of the tariff uncertainty which has done more than anything else to unsettle the market during the last several years, removes any cause for alarm in that direction.

"This year's cane crop will be one of the shortest in recent years. Conservative estimates say it will hardly exceed 150,000 tons. In the face of the strong statistical position, there is no reason why our planters not market their sugar sanely and intelligently.

"When prices declined last year and the growers were compelled to hold, they were brought to a full realization of their own economic strength. This year money is plentiful and there will be no difficulty in obtaining all the funds needed to finance the crop.

"I do not wish to create the impression that Louisiana should hold all of its sugar, for that sort of a policy would prove disastrous in event on an unexpected slump in values. But there is no reason why our planters should rush their output to market without regard to prices. In other words the movement should be gradual."
