## Free Sugar Repeal Passes House By Vote 346 to 14.

Washington, March 16.—Passing the House with a vote of 346 to 14 the Kitchin bill, providing for the unqualified repeal of the freesugar clause of the Underwood tariff, received an auspicious impulse on its course to final enactment. Today's vote surprised even its most optimistic friends.

Of even greater significance than the 14 to 1 vote on the bill itself was the decisive defeat of an amendment providing a consumption tax in lieu of the duty the bill is intended to restore. Howard, of Georgia, presented an amendment providing for an excise tax of one-half cent a pound.

## Progressives Ruled Out.

Last week the Democratic parish candidates filed protests with the Secretary of State, against putting the Progressive candidates for parish offices on the official ballot; for the reason that they had not complied with the State law regarding the nomination of the candidates.

The case was taken by the contest board, and it was declared that they had not complied with the law and would not be placed on the official ballot. This, naturally created consternation among the ranks of the Progressives here and many little groups and caucusses were held discussing this surprise, as it proved a surprise to every body.

The matter, we learned, will be taken up in the courts, but it is generally agreed, that the case of the Progressives is a hopeless one.

## JUDGMENT.

Genevieve Nunn wife vs Dr. D. J. Gragnon husband St. Martin Parish, Louisiana No. 11391 State of Louisiana Judgment dissolving Community of Acquet and Gains.

More than ten judicial days having elapsed since personal notice of Citation was made in this case on Defendant. A Default was entered against Defendant on the 7th day of February 1916, and no motion having been made to set the same aside within the legal delays. On motion of Plaintiff's Attorneys this case was fixed for trial for the 21st of February 1916, and on that day taken up and tried and the law and evidence adduced on the trial thereof being in favor of Plaintiff and against the Defendant.

It is ordered adjudged and decreed that plaintiff, Genevieve Nunn wife of Defendant Dr. D. J. Gragnon, both of this parish, do have Judgment against her said husband Dr. D. J. Graynon, dissolving forever the Committee of Acquets and gains heretofore existing between them, hereby granting Plaintiff the full administration of her present and future property, separate and apart from that of her husband.
