Parish Executive Committee

St. Martinville, La., Sept. 14, 1916. Pursuant to call, the Democratic Executive Committee of the Parish of St. Martin, La., met this day for the purpose of calling and fixing a Primary Election to be held on Sept. 26, 1916, for the purpose of selecting candidates of the Democratic party to be voted upon at the General Election called for Nov. 7, 1916, to elect a Member of the House of Representatives from the Parish of St. Martin, occasioned by the resignation of Mr. Emile Vuillemot; and to provide further, that any qualified electors who desire to become candidates must announce and declare their intentions to do so and hand in their nomination papers in the manner provided by law to the Chairman of the Committee, or before Sept. 21, 1916, and to provide further that all candidates must deposit together with their nomination papers the sum of \$25.00 each, this to defray election expenses incurred.

Resolution covering and comprising the above was introduced by Emile Martin and seconded by Simon Barras by proxy to Emile Martin and carried. Moved, seconded and carried that there being no further business the meeting adjourned.
