My Dear Mr. Editor:

Every enlisted man in the United States Army was entitled to take with him when discharged, the following property:

- a. 1 overseas cap (for all enlisted men who served overseas).
- 1 hat and cord (for all others)
- b. 1 olive drab shirt.
- c. 1 woolen coats and ornaments.
- d. 1 pair woolen breeches.
- e. 1 pair shoes.
- f. 1 pair canvas or spiral leggins. (canvas, if available.)
- g. 1 waist belt.
- h. 1 Slicker.
- i. 1 overcoat.
- j. 1 Suits underwear.
- k. 4 pair stockings.
- l. 1 pair gloves.
- m. 1 gas mask and helmet (for all officers and enlisted men who were issued them overseas).
- n. 1 set toilet articles, including hairbrush, comb, toothbrush, shaving brush, razor, small steel mirror, and 2 towels (if in possession of soldier at time of discharge).
- o. 1 barracks bag.
- p. 3 scarlet chevrons, to be sewed on uniform prior to discharge, when practicable.

Should there be any former enlisted men among your readers who did not secure all of the above property when discharged, they are still entitled to same if they will submit a sworn application certifying that they did not receive certain of the above property which they now desire, and I shall thank you to publish these facts for their benefit.

Those who desire to make application for property may obtain the required blank forms by writing me at 264 House Office Building, Washington, D. C., and I shall take great pleasure in assisting them to secure the desired property.

Proclamation of Election.

Pursuant to an ordinance of the Mayor and Town Council adopted at a meeting held on the 4th day of December 1919, I, Albert Bienvenu, Mayor of the Town of St. Martinville, Louisiana, hereby give notice that, in conformity with said ordinance, a special election will be held in the Town of St. Martinville, Louisiana, on Tuesday the 13th day of January 1920, for the purpose of submitting to the property tax payers qualified under the Constitution and Laws of the State of Louisiana, to vote at said election, the following proposition, to-wit:

Proposition No. 1. To incur debt on behalf of and in the name of the Town of St. Martinville, Louisiana, and issue bonds to the amount of Fifteen Thousand (\$15,000.00) Dollars, to run Twenty (20) years from their date, and to bear interest at the rate of five (5) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, the proceeds from the sale of said bonds at not less than par, to be used for the purpose of constructing and equipping joint systems of waterworks and electric light plant.

For the purpose of holding said election the polling places will be as follows: At the Town Hall, St. Martinville, Louisiana.
At said election the polls will open at seven (7) o'clock a. m., and close at five (5) o'clock p. m., according to law.

Notice is also hereby given that at 2 o'clock, p. m., on Wednesday the fourteenth day of January 1920 the Mayor and Town Council of the Town of St. Martinville, Louisiana, will meet at the Town Hall at St. Martinville, Louisiana, and in open session, proceed to open the ballot boxes, examine and count the ballots in number and amount examine and canvass the returns and declare the result of said special election.
