MR. GUICE AND THAT COMBINE.

It is reported that Mr. Guice at-
tempted to enter into a combine with
the Republican party, whereby the
electoral vote of this state was to be
divided, each of the parties receiving
four; and that the six members of
Congress from Louisiana were to be
subject to a like division, each to re-
ceive three.

If this be true, the members of the
People's Party owe it to themselves
to immediately take steps to repudiate
such a combine.

Unless THE PROGRESS has been de-
ceived, and it thinks it has not, the
platform of the People's Party is pur-
ported to be built on principle, with
a white man's government as the
key-stone of its structure. From
this standpoint, if Mr. Guice at-
tempted any such dicker, it was a
base betrayal of confidence and an
attempt to elevate himself in office
at the risk of placing upon the ankles
of his party's adherents the shackles
of serfdom and negro rule. White
supremacy is dear to the hearts of
the People's Party of Caddo. For
this reign they risked their fortunes
and lives, in the dark days of '66
to '76, and we cannot believe that
they will countenance any such at-
tempt to restore the evil consequences
of negro domination in this State.

THE PROGRESS would like to hear
from the People's Party of Caddo. It
thinks it can now almost hear the
honest and indignant spurning of the
compact which Mr. Guice is reported
to have attempted; and if it be true
that he has, he should hear from his
constituents in tones which he can
not fail to understand.

For the party's future, this reputed
dicker should be roundly and soundly
condemned. We want no coalition
which will strengthen the cause of
Republicanism in Louisiana.
