## GOSPEL MEETINGS

COME TO A CLOSE—WONDERFUL WORK ACCOMPLISHED

IN THE PAST TWO WEEKS.

In our last issue we said the Gospel meetings held at the Opera-house would close Sunday night, but the power for good has been so great that it seemed the people were unwilling for the evangelist to leave. A petition was circulated and signed by every one to whom it was presented, regardless of church or calling. This caused Dr. Wharton to agree to remain over until Tuesday night. Monday night he was again importuned by Dr. Penick asking an expression of the immense audience (without having consulted the evangelist) to remain with us during the week and cancel his engagement at Little Rock, Ark. To this request every man, woman and child responded by rising to their feet.

Dr. Wharton said he had asked Little Rock to release him, and they had refused. That it seemed from the action taken by the people in responding to Dr. Penick's request that he was not in it, so he would leave the matter with Shreveport and Little Rock. No answer was received from Little Rock at noon Tuesday, and the evangelist announced his final meeting be Tuesday night.

This announcement fell upon the congregation with a wave of universal regret. Never before in our life has it been our pleasure and privilege to witness so general a feeling manifested by all without regard to creed or church. In fact both saint and sinner unite with one accord in saying that Dr. Wharton has been a power for good to this city and community, and long after he has left us his coming will be blessed by hundreds who feel that he has shown them a better life and better way. He has made many homes happier, and been the means of causing hundreds to stop and think and change their lives. Let us hope that these resolves may be carried out to the end of life. Again we repeat that his going from us is spoken of with universal regret. Wherever he may go the prayers and best wishes of a united people will follow him from this city. He has not only made the churches better, but in that persuasive and pleading way (peculiar to himself) the man of the world has been made better for having gone to hear him. Surely the power of God is with this man.

Good-bye, Dr. Wharton! your coming among us has caused a bright and beautiful spot to ever remain in our lives, and your leaving one long, lingering regret.

Fully one hundred and fifty people obeyed this request eagerly, and many more arose in the audience.

It seemed hard that the evangelist must cut short his work before the harvest, so ripe, should be finished. He thanked the people, one and all, of Shreveport that they had with one accord stood by him in the past two weeks. He thanked the ministers for their faithful and earnest work as yoke fellows in these meetings.

He then asked if there were any members of the different denominations who wished to speak a word in behalf of their particular church as to the influence the meetings had upon those of their own denominations. Col. R. H. Lindsey and Hon. J. Henry Shepherd spoke for the Presbyterian and Judge C. D. Hicks for the Methodist. Mr. Shepherd spoke more particularly of the influence upon business men and men of the world, and paid a high tribute to the evangelist and thanked him for coming and the good he had accomplished.

A general vote of thanks was given to Manager Carter for the use of the Opera-house; to the press for its faithful work in reporting the meetings; to the organist and immense choir led by Mr. Cyrus Steere during the meetings. In fact Dr. Wharton seemed to feel so good that he thanked everybody, and with a benediction to the Lord the immense congregation took their final leave.

During the meetings a collection was taken up for Dr. Wharton's orphanage in Baltimore and a good sum was raised.

A committee of gentlemen composed of Messrs. J. H. Prescott, George A. Turner, C. D. Hicks, V. L. Fulton, F. H. Gosman, Captain Williams, Allen Morris, W. E. Glassell, unknown to the evangelist, went quietly over the city and raised over five hundred dollars—this was unsolicited by Dr. Wharton—yet the citizens, without regard to church or creed, saint or sinner, responded cheerfully.

Dr. Wharton, by a rising vote of the entire congregation, was invited to visit Shreveport again. He was assured the freedom of the city.
