## Criminal Court Closed.

This has been an extraordinary term of court, there having been more convictions than any other term for a long time in proportion to the number of cases on the docket. There has been thirty-two convictions and five acquittals. The Nash trial consumed much of the time of the court, as the greatest latitude was given by the court in this case.

On last Friday Judge Taylor sentenced all the prisoners except Ernest Nash. counsel for defense, Judge Hicks, argued the case on bills of exception for a new trial, and court adjourned over until Monday at 12 o'clock m., when, after the usual motion hour, Judge Taylor read his decision overruling each and every plea set up by defense.

Nash being in court Judge Taylor asked him to stand up. After asking him if he had any reason why sentence should not be passed and receiving a decided negative, passed sentence of death upon him which he received without any visible marks of effect. This is the second time that a verdict of guilty has been found and twice has Judge Taylor passed the death sentence. An appeal will be taken to the Supreme Court, which will meet in Shreveport some time this month.

Pending a few matters the court adjourned sine die.
