### THE GOSPEL MEETINGS.

#### Dr. Wharton Picks up the Thread

Where Dr. Barron Left Off and Continues to "Tell the Old, Old Story."

Dr. Barron concluded his stay here Friday night and left on Saturday for Dallas, to continue the work in other vineyards in the Master's name.

Dr. Wharton is an earnest, consecrated Christian; he preached sound doctrine, gave his hearers stable, strengthening gospel food which they partook of, and remembered the dispenser in kindness and gratefulness of heart.
