WEATHER FORECAST.

A High Temperature Followed by a Cool Wave.

[Copyright, 1900, by W. T. Foster.]
St. Joseph, Mo., December 15.—Last bulletin gave forecasts of storm wave to cross continent 17 to 21, warm wave 16 to 20, cool wave 19 to 23.

Storm wave will reach Pacific coast about 21, cross west of Rockies by close of 22, great central valleys 23 to 25, Eastern States 25.

Warm wave will cross west of Rockies about 21, great central valleys 23, Eastern States 25.

Cool wave will cross west of Rockies about 24, great central valleys 26, Eastern States 28.

This disturbance will bring a great rise in temperature, and after it has passed the temperature will remain warmer than it was before the disturbance came.

The lowest average temperature of the month was calculated for the week ending 23 and the week ending 29 will average much warmer. A little earlier west and later east of meridian 90.

The high temperature wave, due on meridian 90 about 24, will cause a remarkably sudden rise and the storm wave will quickly cross the continent, following which the cool wave will not be severe.

ICADDO LEVEE BOARD.

The Proceedings of the Session Held December 14.

The Caddo Levee Board met in the office of the secretary on Thursday, December 13, in adjourned session: Present—T. F. Bell, president, presiding with E. M. Smith, John Bentell, John Glassell, C. W. Lane, W. F. Taylor and J. M. Robinson.

The minutes of the last session, November 28, were read and approved.
Assessor Nicholson's bill for \$200 as compensation for his services in making up the report of the produce tax for the past four years, was presented, and on motion of Mr. Lane, duly seconded, the secretary was instructed to pay the same.
D. T. Land, attorney, reported the assessor's bill for \$100 for assessment roll as correct, and on motion same was ordered paid.

Mr. Taylor offered the following resolution, duly seconded:
"Resolved that the secretary of the board be directed to wire the Hon. Phasor Brazzale at once requesting him not to take nor permit any action regarding lake lands in the Caddo levee district without conferring with this board." Carried.

On motion the board went into executive session.
Executive session closed and open session resumed.

The following bids for lands were accepted: E. W. George, 160 acres at \$7.50; N. T. Williamson, 160 acres at \$10; E. M. Adger, 400 acres at \$10 and 160 acres at \$13; J. N. Gilliam, 80 acres at \$7.10; N. A. Wasson, 161 acres at \$7.50 and J. P. Flournoy, 1578 acres at \$8.

All other bids were rejected and new bids invited, to be opened at next meeting.
On motion of Mr. Taylor, duly seconded, all parties who have purchased lands from this board are required to come forward and take deed or satisfy the board with proper security within thirty days from this date, or their purchase will be vacated. Adopted.
The board adjourned to meet on Thursday, January 17, 1901.

THE CITY COUNCIL.

A Synopsis of the Proceedings of Thursday Night's Session

The City Council was convened Thursday night in adjourned session, His Honor, Hon. Ben Holzman, mayor, presiding.

Dr. J. C. Egan, president of the Shreveport Board of Health, suggested the advisability of instituting a system for the inspection of milk, and submitted a resolution therefor which had been drawn by the city attorney and the sanitary committee of the Board of Health, and had been adopted by the Board of Health. The ordinance provides for a milk inspector and the condemnation of adulterated milk or milk from diseased cows, and milk failing to reach a specific gravity. The inspector is to receive a fee of one cent per cow or inspection.

Action on this ordinance, which was opposed by Councilmen Wagner and Crain and favored by Councilman Mabry, was deferred until January.

The joint committees—street lighting and franchise committees—through Councilman Bernstein, reported favorably on the bid of the Shreveport Gas, Electric Light and Power Company, with the condition that twenty five additional lights be required, and the right is reserved to the city to locate and change any or all the lights. The report of the committee was accepted and the contract was awarded unanimously to the company named for a period of five years, beginning at the expiration of their present contract which will expire in 1905.

An ordinance by Mr. Alston, providing fire escapes for certain buildings in the city, was adopted.

A committee of the Industrial League—A. Currie, Chas. C. McCloud and C. Scott DeLay—submitted a memorial, which was read, and in which is suggested the extension and improvement of Commerce street, as being the most economical route to the Hargrove Cotton Mill. The proposition was viewed favorably by the Council.

Councilman Mabry called attention to the fact that the meat inspector's salary in fees amounted last month to over \$173, which is a larger salary than was intended when the schedule was adopted. A lively discussion followed, during which the inspection was criticized and provoked the risibles of the Council and spectators. Action was deferred.

The Council having considered other business, was adjourned to Wednesday, December 19.
