IMPORTANT OPINIONS.

Responsibility of a Railroad Engineer on the Prairie

Among the decisions of the Supreme Court of Louisiana at the session held in New Orleans, Monday, January 7, is the following, by Chief Justice Nicholls in the case of Marie Hebert vs. Louisiana Western Railroad.

"Syllabus.—The engineer of a train running on schedule time, on its own right of way in the open prairie away from any town or crossing, is not called upon to immediately slacken its speed, from the simple fact that a trespasser sitting upon the ties does not at once rise and change his position on receiving warning of the approach of the train by the ringing of the bell, and the blowing of the whistle, duly and properly given.

LETTERS OF AN ELEVATOR BOY.

In the case of Santo Russo vs. The Morris Building Land Improvement Company, on rehearing before the court, the following is the syllabus:

"It is the duty of the party operating an elevator to see that the passengers are on to give them sufficient time to adjust themselves before starting it. If the elevator be started at once with full speed before a passenger has time to place himself securely on his feet and he is thereby injured, the operator is responsible for the injury."

Modern Tendency

A young pastor in a college town was embarrassed by the thought of criticism in his cultivated congregation. He sought counsel from his father, an old and wise itinerant, saying:

WEATHER BULLETIN.

St. Joseph, Mo., January 12.—Last bulletin gave forecast of cold wave to cross country about 15 to 19.

Storm wave will reach Pacific coast about 18, cross west of Rockies by close of day, great central valleys 20 to 22, Eastern states 3.

Warm wave will cross west of Rockies about 17, great central valleys 23, Eastern states 25.

This disturbance will bring one of the high temperature waves of the month and will inaugurate the second dry spell of January.

Full moon 21 will come a cool wave, not a cold wave, and the temperature will go a little below normal with very little precipitation and then dry again and an upward turn in the temperature about 25.
