CITY COUNCIL.

Official Proceedings of Session Held
January 20, 1903.

City Hall, Shreveport, La., Jan. 20,
1903.—Council met in regular adjourned
session with Mayor Querbes presiding
and the following councilmen present:
Busbey, Conger, Currie, Dickson, Fos-
ter, Jenkins, Ledbetter, Lowenthal, Quigles,
Rand, Snyder, Thoman, Tusten, Wise.

The following petition was read:
Shreveport, La., Jan. 16, 1903.—To
the Mayor and Council: We respectfully
ask that you come as a body, or
are represented by at least three mem-
bers, to a meeting of representatives
from all women's organizations in the
city, having for its object the organiza-
tion of a City Improvement League. We
hope in this movement to make each
citizen a co-worker with the council for
the beauty, cleanliness and general up-
lift of Shreveport. Come to this meet-
ing. Give us your sanction and the aid
of your presence must give.

Invitation accepted with thanks.
The following was also read:
Shreveport, La., Jan. 16, 1903.—To
the Mayor and City Council: We ask
that the ordinance on "expectation,"
page 218, have the words "halls, stair-
ways and floors of public buildings"
inserted. And have the ordinance better
enforced.

Also enforcement of ordinance on
importing of paupers, page 126.

And that you make an ordinance with
a fine penalty for advertising with
doggers and other print matter being
scattered on the streets, in yards or
doorways.

That the ordinance passed in October
providing for trash boxes on corners,
with a \$200 appropriation for same,
have the words added: "That these
boxes shall be made of galvanized iron,
painted dark green, with the words 'for
trash' painted in white letters on the
sides. Said boxes shall be attached by
a chain to some fixture." Violation of
box ordinance by throwing trash on
street to have a fine penalty.

That an ordinance be passed estab-
lishing a building line on the residence
streets.

By granting our requests our impor-
tunities will cease.

dead was included.

By Mr. Conger—
That ordinance committee frame or-
dinance governing hackmen, hotel run-
ners, etc., at depots.

Adopted.
The following was submitted:
Shreveport, La., Jan. 20, 1903.—Hon.
A. Querbes, Mayor City of Shreveport:
Dear Sir—I beg to call your attention to
the drainage of Common street at the
intersection of Cypress avenue, there
being no outlet at said place for drain-
age on account of the high embankment
of the Texas and Pacific railway, which
obstructs the natural outlet. Hence, for
relief, I had a ditch dug through my
property. But this ditch having to drain
a territory of one or two square miles,
is insufficient and is causing the banks
along said ditch to cave and will ulti-
mately undermine the foundations of
my houses.

Hence I find myself compelled to
close said outlet, and by so doing will
cause the water to remain on Common
street, making it impassable and un-
sanitary.

I would therefore ask you and your
honorable body the city council to
confer with the Texas and Pacific Rail-
way Company to the end that they will
place a culvert at said intersection,
which will afford all necessary relief.

Trusting that my appeal to you will
meet with your kind consideration, I

Referred to improvement committee.
By Mr. Conger—
That the auditor receive an additional
allowance of \$10 per month as com-
pensation as secretary to the mayor and
of committees.

Adopted.
The auditor stated that several prop-
erty owners were indebted to the city
for sidewalks and alley and street pav-
ing.

By Mr. Conger—
That the accounts be turned over to
the city attorney to enforce collections.
Adopted.

By Mr. Currie—
That the mayor appoint a committee
to investigate the question of a new
city map.

Adopted.
Councilmen Currie, Conger and Dick-
son were named by mayor as commit-
tee.

By Mr. Currie—
That all accounts be referred to re-
spective committee and listed and sub-
mitted to council for approval.

Adopted.
By Mr. Rand—
Shreveport, La., Dec. 16, 1902.—To
the Finance Committee of the Council
of the City of Shreveport, the Hon. E.
B. Rand, Chairman, and the under-

signed, with your permission, make the
following proposition:

We look up, abstract and put the city
in possession of such of her property
holdings as have for any reason been
lost or dropped or are at present un-
known to her and such as may be in
the possession of third persons claiming
adversely to said city the question as
to whether said property is to be con-
sidered lost or dropped property and
the commission due us for work on
same to be left entirely to your hon-
orable committee as amicable compound-
ers. The city to pay as a consideration
for the above work 25 per cent of the
value of the property so recovered, or
25 per cent of the proceeds.

And we hereby further agree that if
we find more than \$8000 worth of such
lost or dropped property, on such over-
plus of \$8000 we shall receive as com-
pensation only 15 per cent of the value
of said overplus under the same agree-
ments and stipulations as above set
forth. It is further understood that
streets and alleys are not intended to
be included in this contract.

The undersigned to bear all costs and
expenses necessary to put city in pos-
session of said property.

That proposition be submitted to the
mayor, city attorney and finance
committee to secure security in lieu of
bonds to be taken up. Full power to be
granted to committee, mayor and city
attorney.

Mr. Wise was here excused.
The ordinance prescribing district
for lewd women introduced and passed
through first reading January 19, 1903,
was read the second time and passed
through second reading by the following
vote:

Ordinance lay over thirty days for
final passage.
By Mr. Jenkins—
Shreveport, La., Jan. 7, 1903.—Mr.
John Jenkins, Chairman Water Com-
mittee, City: Dear Sir—We beg to call
your attention to the existing condition
of affairs in reference to the reinforce-
ment of water main ordered in by the
council about a year ago, or about July,
1902. At that time it was proposed to
run a water main from the intersection
of Common and Cypress streets down
Cypress street to McNeil, thence on
McNeil to Wylie street to the property
of the Shreveport and Red River Valley
Railway Company, thence through the
grounds of the Shreveport and Red
River Valley Railway Company's shops
through the property of the Ice and Re-
frigerating Company, thence through
the property of the Union Oil Company
to Spring street, thence through the
property of the Victoria Lumber Com-
pany to Commerce street, connecting in
with present 8-inch line on Commerce
street at Caddo.

After several attempts to secure the
right of way along the line indicated we
were finally compelled to abandon this
plan. We then proposed another line
which was to begin at our pump-
station, coming down McNeil street to
Cypress street, thence along Cypress
street to Commerce street. This line
would follow the right of way of the
Texas and Pacific railway from McNeil
to Spring street and probably to Com-
merce street. This plan was not sub-
mitted to council as we thought best to
first make an attempt to get the right of
way from the Texas and Pacific Rail-
way Company. Following out this idea
we explained the matter to the officials
of the Texas and Pacific railway, who
at first seeme declined to grant the
desired right of way, but a few days
later reconsidered the matter and de-
clined to allow the same to be laid as
proposed. This brings the proposed
improvement to a standstill unless the
city authorities will take the matter up
with the Texas and Pacific officials and
extert their influence toward secur-
ing permission to lay the main. We believe
that the Texas and Pacific railway offi-
cials do not realize the importance to
the city of having this line of pipe laid,
and if the matter were brought to their
attention by the city authorities that
they would probably give permission to
go through their property. Yours truly,

Committee: Dear Sir—Would respect-
fully call your attention to the real
necessity of continuing water main
from Texas street along Spring street
to Crockett street. The accompanying
plan will give you an idea of the exist-
ing hazards and the placing of plugs,
which the main will allow, will be of the
greatest importance in getting to the rear
of buildings (where fires might occur)
promptly, without laying an unneces-
sary amount of hose. This unprotected
district is of great commercial value and
the extension of this main will afford
greater protection than now exists and
from the locality the hazards will tend
to increase in the passing of years and
it will only be a question of time when
the main will be of vital importance. I
beg to suggest that your honorable com-
mittee give this an early consideration.
