ROBERT E. LEE

In Statuary Hall at the Capitol Beside George Washington.

A special to the Memphis Commercial Appeal dated Washington, January 27, says:

Virginia's proposition to place a statue of General Robert E. Lee in Statuary Hall at the capitol beside that of George Washington, has been discussed in Washington for the past few weeks. There have been many expressions favorable and adverse to the proposed plan. Interviews today with leading Republicans in Congress lead to the belief that if Virginia decides to honor the memory of Lee by placing a statue of the distinguished soldier in Statuary Hall, Congress will not object.

Of all the Northern men who have been seen, Senator Depew of New York is the most hearty in his expression of favor to the acceptance of the statue. Many say privately they would not oppose it, but Senator Depew does not mince words. The following is his statement: "My opinion on this subject is very clear. The war between the North and the South was fought for the preservation of the Union. This question has been discussed in debate by the two sides ever since the framing of the articles of the confederation. The Union side won. The issue was accepted at once by the defeated side, and I think the placing of a statue of General Robert E. Lee in Statuary Hall would be an emphatic recognition of the fact that we are all now advocates of nationality and its perpetuity. I am heartily in favor of the Lee statue."

Senator Beveridge said when asked for his views in regard to the acceptance of the Lee statue: "Owing to my being occupied with the statehood bill I have not had time to give this matter careful consideration, and I should like to go into it thoroughly before giving an opinion. I am inclined to think, however, that I would favor receiving the statue."

Representative Crumpacker of Indiana, one of the leading Republicans in the House, and who has been trying for years to have passed a measure looking to the reduction of the representation of the South in Congress, is another who comes out squarely with the statement that he would not oppose the proposed plan.

"In my opinion," said Judge Crumpacker, "the settlement of this question should be left entirely to Virginia. Robert E. Lee was a distinguished citizen of the country. He was a conspicuous figure in the cause of the Confederacy, a cause which Virginia espoused (and if Virginia wants to remember him by placing his statue in Statuary Hall, personally I see no reason why she should not do so. Lee is Virginia's son, and it is for her to decide this question as she sees fit."

Representative Hay of Virginia said today that he had come to the conclusion that it would be just as well for the Virginia Legislature to go ahead and pass the bill, whatever the consequences might be.

CHARTER

Of The W. K. Henderson Iron Works and Supply Company, Limited.

State of Louisiana, Parish of Caddo: Be it known that this day before me, E. B. Herndon, a notary public in and for said parish and State, duly appointed and qualified, and in the presence of witnesses hereinafter named, and undersigned, personally came and appeared the several persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, and declared that, availing themselves of the provisions of Act No. 36 of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, approved January 29, 1898, as well as those of the general laws of the State relative to the laws of organization of corporations, they have formed and do by these presents form and organize this into a corporation, for the objects and purposes and under the stipulations hereinafter set forth, which they do hereby accept as their charter, to-wit:

ARTICLE I. The name and title of said corporation shall be "The W. K. Henderson Iron Works and Supply Company, Limited," and by that name it shall have power and authority to have and enjoy succession for the term of ninety-nine years from and after the date hereof; to contract, sue and be sued; to make and use a corporate seal and the same to change at pleasure; to hold, receive, lease and purchase, alienate and convey, as well as mortgage and hypothecate property, real, personal and mixed; to name and appoint such managers, directors, officers and agents as the interest of said corporation as may be necessary and proper, and the same to alter at pleasure.

ARTICLE II. The domicile of said corporation shall be in the city of Shreveport, Caddo parish, Louisiana, and all citations and legal processes shall be served on the president of said corporation, or in his absence upon the vice president, and in case of the absence of both, on the secretary at the office of said corporation.

ARTICLE III. The purposes for which this corporation is organized and the nature of the business to be carried on by it are declared to be: The manufacture of machines of various kinds; also buying and selling of machinery, hardware and general mill supplies; also to run a general repair shop, including foundry business—or to be more specific, to make, buy and do anything pertaining to wood, iron and other metals.

ARTICLE IV. The capital of said corporation shall be three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000), to be divided into three thousand (3,000) shares of one hundred

dollars (\$100) each; provided that the corporation may commence business when two thousand (2,000) shares of stock are subscribed and paid in.

This stock shall be paid for in cash, or its equivalent, when subscribed for, or the same may be issued at not less than par, in payment of property purchased by the corporation.

ARTICLE V. All the corporate powers of said corporation shall be vested in a board of directors, to be composed of five stockholders, which board shall be elected annually on the second Monday in January beginning in the year nineteen hundred and four.

The first board of directors is declared to be W. K. Henderson, W. S. Dunkin, W. E. Dillon, P. Garson and John R. Jones, with W. K. Henderson as president, W. E. Dillon, vice president, and W. S. Dunkin as secretary and treasurer. Said board to serve until 1904, or until their successors are duly elected thereto.

The directors shall be elected by the stockholders. Each share of stock to be entitled to one vote, to be cast by its owner or in proxy, and the majority of votes cast shall elect. Three directors shall constitute a quorum.

The president shall or may appoint from time to time, and dismiss at pleasure, such managers, agents and employees as may be deemed necessary for the purposes and business of the corporation. The board of directors may make such laws and regulations for the management of the business as they may deem necessary, and amend and alter same; and shall have power to contract debts, borrow money, issue bills of exchange, notes, acceptances, execute mortgages, and generally do all things incident to the object and purposes of said corporation.

ARTICLE VI. This charter may be modified, changed or altered, or said corporation dissolved, with the consent of three-fourths of the amount of capital stock represented at any general meeting of the stockholders convened for that purpose after ten (10) days previous notice shall have been published in one of the daily newspapers in the city of Shreveport.

Whenever this corporation is dissolved, from limitation or from any other cause, its affairs shall be liquidated by two commissioners elected by the stockholders, who shall have full power to wind up its affairs, dispose of its assets, settle its liabilities and distribute the proceeds among the stockholders.

ARTICLE VII. No stockholder shall be liable for the contracts or faults of said corporation in any further sum than the unpaid balance due to the corporation on shares owned by them.

No share of stock shall be transferred, sold or disposed of, without the stockholders first giving thirty (30) days' notice to other stockholders and allowing them the privilege of first purchasing said stock at its actual value.

All sales or transfers of stock to be valid must be made on the books of the corporation.

Done and passed in my office in the presence of John A. Sewall and J. C. Beasley, competent witnesses, on this 20th day of January, nineteen hundred and three.
