THOMAS G. HAYES

Died of Pneumonia in New Orleans. Was Mayor Querbes' Secretary.

New Orleans States January 4: With characteristic manliness and bravery, and with philosophical resignation to the inevitable, which he had for days realized was fast approaching, Thomas G. Hayes, recognized as one of the most capable newspaper men in the State, a gentleman and a man held in high esteem by his fellow supporters, laid down his earthly burden this morning at 7:20 o'clock.

Mr. Hayes was born in Houston thirty-two years ago, and had his education in the schools of the Texas city. As far as is known he had been engaged in the newspaper business for a number of years, having worked as a reporter on papers in Houston, Birmingham, Atlanta, St. Louis and Shreveport, La., and had served in the capacity of private secretary to Mayor Querbes of Shreveport.

A year or so ago he developed Bright's disease, and being an Elk of the Shreveport lodge that lodge sent him to Stafford Springs in the hope that he might there find a cure.

After undergoing treatment at the springs and realizing improvement, he came to New Orleans four or five months ago and found employment on the Daily News. In point of ability as a writer, reporter and friend-maker, he soon evidenced his ability and came to be generally liked by all who became acquainted with him, especially his fellow men in the newspaper world.

Soon after he came to New Orleans the dread malady from which he had been suffering again made its presence evident, but notwithstanding this fact he worked on bravely until attacked by a severe cold, which developed into pneumonia.

It was finally decided by his physicians that it would be best to remove him to Dr. Dana's ward in the hospital where he would be given proper nursing, and this was done.

All that medical science could do was done for him but in vain. He sank rapidly to the end, which came, as related, this morning at half-past seven o'clock.

The news of his death occasioned sincere regret among his fellow newspaper men. The local lodge of Elks took charge of the remains and will conduct the funeral, which will take place this afternoon.

Telegrams were sent to the newspapers in Houston in the hope that if he had any living relatives they may be communicated with.

The deceased had many friends in Shreveport who will mourn his untimely end. He was for several months on the staff of the Shreveport Times and that of the Journal.

SPECIAL ORDER

Issued to Disband Company B, of of Homer, La.

The Picayune's Baton Rouge special dated January 4 says: The following special order for the disbandment of Company B, of Homer, was issued today by the Adjutant General:

"I. Upon the recommendation of the commanding officer and the approval of Colonel F. P. Stubbs, Jr., Company B, First Regiment Infantry, Louisiana National Guard, is hereby ordered disbanded.

"2. Captain Lowell C. Butler, quartermaster, First Infantry, Louisiana National Guard, will proceed to Homer, in the parish of Claiborne, and muster said company out of the service of the State of Louisiana, and cause all ordnance and quartermaster stores to be shipped to Major Frank Lohran, State armorer, New Orleans, La., duplicate invoices to accompany the shipment. All available money in the hands of the company will be sent to this office."

CHARTER OF THE COLONIAL REALTY COMPANY, LIMITED.

State of Louisiana, Parish of Caddo: Be it remembered, that on this 26th day of November 1906, personally came and appeared before me, John D. Wilkinson, a Notary Public in and for said parish and State, Mrs. Annie Cornell and her husband, H. N. Cornell, James H. Van Hoose and James Hugh Van Hoose, residents of Bossier Parish, said State, who stated and declared to me, Notary, that availing themselves of the Constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana, they have formed and constituted and do by these presents form and constitute themselves into a corporation and body corporate, as well as such other persons as may hereafter become associated with them, and have adopted and do by these presents ordain as their charter or act of incorporation the following, to-wit:

ARTICLE I. The name and title of this corporation shall be the "COLONIAL REALTY COMPANY, LIMITED," with its domicile at the City of Shreveport in said Parish and State, and under said corporate name it shall have and enjoy succession for a period of fifty years, unless sooner dissolved as hereinafter set forth.

ARTICLE II. The purposes for which this corporation is formed and its objects are hereby declared to be, to purchase, own, subdivide and sell real estate in the City of Shreveport and in the Parish of Caddo, and such real estate to develop and improve as to the directors of said company may seem advisable.

ARTICLE III. The capital stock of this corporation shall be sixty thousand dollars, divided into six hundred shares of one hundred dollars each, and it shall commence business whenever twenty-five thousand dollars of its capital stock is subscribed and paid for. Such stock shall be paid for either in cash, property, real or personal, or services performed for the corporation prior to the issuance of such stock, and no stock shall be issued unless fully paid for. Such stock shall be transferable only on the books of the company on the surrender of the outstanding certificates.

ARTICLE IV. The affairs of this corporation shall be managed by a board of directors consisting of three stockholders who shall be elected annually on the first Monday of December of each year at a stockholders meeting called for that purpose, and shall hold their offices until the first Monday in December of the following year, or until their successors are elected and installed. The first board of directors shall be J. H. Van Hoose, president; H. N. Cornell, vice president; James Hugh Van Hoose, secretary and treasurer.

Said board of directors shall have full power and authority to do and perform any act or acts, to make any purchase, mortgage or sale or pledge of the property of the corporation as in their judgment may deem best, and shall have power to employ and discharge such managers, agents or other employes as may be necessary in the conduct of the business.

ARTICLE V. Said corporation shall have power to sue and be sued, to contract and be contracted with, to buy and sell, mortgage and pledge any and all kind of property and particularly real estate or lots in the City of Shreveport and in the Parish of Caddo.

ARTICLE VI. This charter may be amended, altered or abolished and this corporation may be dissolved at a vote of two-thirds of the stockholders at a stockholders meeting held for that purpose, after legal notices thereof in the manner required by law. Provided that in matters not otherwise provided by law the stockholders

may by unanimous consent waive any notice of a stockholders meeting. When this corporation is dissolved, either by limitation or under the vote of its stockholders, its affairs shall be liquidated and settled by two liquidators elected by the stockholders, who shall perform such duties and give such bond as the stockholders may require. In all stockholders meetings, each share of stock shall be entitled to one vote either by its holder or by written proxy, and all notices to stockholders shall be by publication in one of the newspapers published in the City of Shreveport whenever such notice is required by law.

ARTICLE VII. No stockholder of this corporation shall be held liable for the contract or debts thereof in any greater sum than the balance due on his stock, and no informality or defect in the organization hereof shall have the effect of rendering this charter null or of exposing any stockholder to any greater liability than the unpaid balance due on such stock. In testimony whereof said parties have hereunto subscribed their names with the amount of the stock subscribed and paid for by each set opposite their several names, which shall serve as subscription list, in presence of the competent attesting witnesses, on the date herein first written.
