SENATOR FOSTER

A TALK WITH A REPRESENTATIVE OF THE STATES.

LOUISIANA FARED WELL

In Present Session and Has Two New Projects in the River and Harbor Bill, Intercoastal Canal and Locking and Deepening the Upper Teche.

New Orleans States Feb. 17: Senator Murphy J. Foster arrived in the city last night at 7 o'clock on a train that was nine hours late, having started to his home because of the severe illness of Miss Wade, who reared his wife. But Miss Wade died last night, so the senator will only reach his home tomorrow in time for the funeral. He was at the St. Charles Hotel last night.

In discussing affairs that have recently attracted attention in Washington, the senator said he had never believed in the possibilities of a war with Japan.

"Now it seems that the Japanese issue which grew up out of the exclusion of the Japanese from the public schools of San Francisco has been finally settled," said the senator, "through the conferences and the resultant agreements as to amending the immigration bill. The amendment agreed to and which in all probability will become a part of the bill when passed, authorizes the President to use his discretion in keeping undesirable immigrants out of this country. This is satisfactory to the Californians and the Japanese will be allowed to re-enter the schools of San Francisco. The Japanese will be allowed passes to go to the American colonies, the Philippines, the Hawaiian Islands and others, but they will not have such an easy time in coming to the United States proper. The coolies and the undesirable classes may be restricted.

"The immigration bill is held by those opposed to it to nullify the recent ruling of Commissioner Strauss to the effect that the authorized representatives of States might go to Europe and solicit desirable immigrants. Those who favor the bill say there will be no such nullification in its terms. I am in favor of the States having the right to go abroad and seek desirable immigrants.

"As to the Brownsville investigation, it promised to extend beyond the present session of Congress. So far the testimony of the negro soldiers seems to be almost identical. They say they know nothing about the 'shooting up' of Brownsville and that the white people did the shooting.

"Louisiana has fared very well during this session of Congress. It has had liberal appropriations for levees, for the Southwest Pass work, for the river and the various streams throughout the State, for the immigration station, and two new and important items have been put in the rivers and harbors bill, an appropriation of \$380,000 for the building of the inter-coastal canal from the Mermentau river to the mouth of the Sabine, and for the deepening and locking of the Upper Teche to a depth of six feet.

"Appropriations have also been put in the bill for the building of the inter-coastal canal in Texas. The value of this canal to the people of Louisiana is very great. It will provide all of the country from Franklin to the Sabine with direct water connections through the Plaquemine locks to New Orleans. Congressman Pujoe has been very energetic in this matter. He will have a hard fight in the conference, but he is energetic and he is most likely to win. Congressman Davey told me he thought the immigration station would come out all right.

"The other new project in the bill, that of building locks in the Upper Teche to provide six feet of water from St. Martinsville up, is one that will be of great benefit to the people of that section.

"In the matter of the appointment of Hon. E. D. Saunders to the judgeship for this Federal district made vacant by the recent death of Judge Parlange, President Roosevelt rose above party and appointed a Democrat, because he was convinced he was pre-eminent the man for the place. Prominent men all over the country now demand that the judiciary of the South be made up of the very best legal talent the South affords, regardless of party lines. And the President fully coincides with this view and appealed for the appointment of Judge E. D. Saunders. Of course the President would prefer to appoint Republicans whenever possible, but he will not hesitate to go outside of his party in judiciary appointments.

"In the matter of the use of sulphur in the manufacture of sugar, Senator McEnery and myself, as has before been published, conferred with Dr. Wiley and now the sugar manufacturers have an

THE CAUSE OF LABOR

Mayor Schmitz Accused of Having Betrayed the Cause.

San Francisco, Feb. 18.—The news of Mayor Schmitz's compromise with President Roosevelt on the Japanese school question has thrown union labor into a rage.

The executive committee of the Japanese and Korean Exclusion League will defer action in the matter until specific information has been received as to just what Mayor Schmitz has agreed to.

Individual labor leaders are not so conservative and do not hesitate to accuse Mayor Schmitz of betraying the cause of union labor.

A Hycell, secretary of the Exclusion League, last night said: "If Mayor Schmitz has made any agreement by which Japanese children are to be allowed to attend the same schools as American children it will be better for him not to come back to San Francisco."

A MYSTERY SOLVED EASILY.

Two infants, a boy two weeks old and a girl two months old, were left at the home of Mr. C. M. Suggart, 1017 Common street, at 6:20 o'clock Sunday evening. The unnatural mothers are a young woman, unmarried, who was employed in a home in this city, and the other a married woman separated from her husband and was employed as a waitress in a restaurant or eating house. The women had been in the hospital which they left Sunday afternoon with their babies. The women left on the vicksburg, Shreveport and Pacific train. It is the old story, and to moralize would be a waste of space and time. The abandoned babies will receive proper care.

CHARTER

OF THE GEO. W. SIGNOR TIE COMPANY, LIMITED.

State of Louisiana, Parish of Caddo, do hereby certify that on the 1st day of January 1907, personally came and appeared before me, J. A. Thigpen, a notary public in and for said Parish and State, George W. Signor, Frank Fonville and C. W. Billeter, all residents of Shreveport, Caddo Parish, Louisiana, all of full age, who declared that, availing themselves of the laws of the State of Louisiana relative to the formation of corporations, they have covenanted and agreed, and do by these present covenants and agree and bind themselves as well as such other persons as may hereafter become associated with them to form and constitute a corporation and body politic in law, for the purpose and objects, and under the stipulations, articles and conditions following, to-wit:

ARTICLE I.

The name and title of said corporation shall be GEO. W. SIGNOR TIE COMPANY, LIMITED, and its domicile is hereby established in Shreveport, State of Louisiana; and under its said corporate name said corporation shall have power to contract, sue and be sued; to make and use a corporate seal, and to hold, break and alter at pleasure; to buy, have, purchase, improve, alienate, convey, sell, borrow, pledge, mortgage and hypothecate under its said corporate name property real, personal or mixed; to name and appoint such officers, directors, managers and agents of the corporation as they may require; to make and establish by-laws, rules and regulations for the proper management and regulation of its affairs, as may be deemed necessary and proper, and the same to alter and change at pleasure; and to do all other acts and things permitted by law, or as shall be necessary and proper to carry out the objects and purposes of this corporation.

ARTICLE II.

Said corporation, unless sooner dissolved in accordance with its charter, shall exist and continue for a period of ninety-nine years from and after the date hereof.

ARTICLE III.

The objects and purposes for which this corporation is organized, and the nature and business to be carried on by it, are declared to be the following, to-wit: To manufacture, buy and sell railroad timbers and ties, and generally all such material as is used in the construction of railroad work, and for this purpose to acquire lands and property; to construct, purchase, or otherwise acquire such buildings, factories or machinery or implements as may be necessary and proper for the carrying out of such objects.

ARTICLE IV.

The capital stock of this corporation shall be one hundred thousand dollars divided into and represented by one thousand shares of one hundred dollars each, which stock shall be paid for at the time of its subscription in cash or in property or for other valuable considerations or services as the board of directors may determine.

ARTICLE V.

Any stockholder may sell, assign or
