WEATHER BULLETIN

FORECAST OF STORMS TO CROSS THE CONTINENT.

THE NEXT DISTURBANCE

Will Develop Greater Than Usual Intensity or Energy—Dangerous Drouth Will Prevail in Some Sections—High Temperatures Over the Continent.

Washington, D. C., May 25.—Last bulletin gave forecasts of disturbance to cross the continent 26 to 30, warm wave 25 to 29, cool wave 28 to June 1. The next disturbance will reach the Pacific coast about June 2, cross west of the Rockies country by close of 3, the great central valleys 4 to 6, eastern states 7. Warm wave will cross west of Rockies about 2, the great central valleys 4, eastern states 6. Cool wave will cross west of the Rockies about 5, great central valleys 7, eastern states 9.

All re disturbances of June will develop greater than usual energy or intensity. A peculiar feature will be that southern sections, particularly southwest parts of the great central valleys, will have temperatures in June averaging much above normal while in the southeast and northwest sections temperatures will average about normal.

The disturbance above described will be of more than usual force in all its wester features. Probabilities favor severe weather during the entire passage of the high and low of this disturbance across the continent.

The last half of June will inaugurate a dangerous drouth in some sections and very high temperatures on all parts of the continent. A danger period will occur from June 23 to 30, about and following a great hot wave. Better prepare to take rest about that time and watch the elements. The dangerous features of this great storm wave will probably miss your locality but they will not miss all sections. The disturbance will affect all sections but at what particular place it will suddenly reach its greatest intensity I will not undertake, at this time, to indicate.

I am glad to be able to announce that another friend, of ample means, has come to my aid financially and is furnishing all the money I need for the purpose of fully developing and perfecting my system of forecasting the weather. UNION SLAUGHTER HOUSE

An Explanation on the Part of the Board of Health.

The Caucasian was complimented yesterday by a call from Dr. Ashton Blanchard, president of the Board of Health, who explained the necessity of the Union Slaughter House, as contemplated by an ordinance pending in the City Council.

As stated by Dr. Blanchard, twenty-five per cent of the meat consumed in Shreveport is slaughtered in pens in this parish, some being nine miles from the corporate limits of the city, and as these pens are isolated it is not possible for the inspector to inspect the animals before slaughtering.

The purpose of the Union Slaughter House as explained by Dr. Blanchard is to concentrate all cattle to be slaughtered for market in the slaughter house which is to be under the care and supervision of the inspector and it will then be impossible for any diseased animal to be sold to consumers.

It has been estimated that the revenue from the slaughter house will aggregate \$150 a month, which will be more than sufficient to defray all the expenses connected with the slaughtering and including the salary of the inspector.

Dr. Blanchard gave assurance that no job was to be provided for any one and that as the inspector will not have to travel over long distances to reach intermediate private slaughter pens, that inspectors' fees may be reduced. At least he could afford to inspect for a reduced salary.

There is a feature, however, which should receive the closest attention, and that is the kind of cattle slaughtered, even if it be free from every taint of disease. There have been sold to consumers cattle which while healthy have been from appearances as poor as Job's turkey. It would scarcely be profitable or desirable to have that kind of cattle slaughtered. The cattle which fail to measure up to requirements should be excluded from sale to consumers no matter by whom or where slaughtered.

LIFE'S TRAGEDIES

Sorrows That Await the Unwelcome Child Who Comes Without Love or Impulse of Heart Maternity.

Life has many tragedies, but no tragedy equals the cruel destiny, the diabolical drenching of sorrow that awaits the unwelcome child who comes to a mother's breast without love or the warmth of a mother's joy or impulse of heart maternity.

The married woman who disdains motherhood is a fungus of society, an impassioned mould of bridge whist hysteria, and the erratic aberrations of the meanness and falsehood of obtaining a husband under false pretenses and understandings. A fungus "want no children" wife has but one idea of marriage—a bill payer, a porcupine quill to sign checks, and a fool to smile attendance escort when night society events require a protector.

The unwelcome child is bound in a tide of corroding neglect and heartless tyranny and indifference. This kind of mother, with her bank of Marcel waded hair, has but one thought of life, the style and fashion of her dress and her stimulations of bridge wist, with all its compliments of thief accusations and curse words, and the tincture of punch, weak and otherwise.

The unwelcome child's babyhood of condensed milk and all kinds of patent baby foods, is healed into narcotic silence with the impatience of a paid nurse. When it toddles it goes anywhere but to its mother's arms. When it walks it creeps dirty and unkempt into boarders' rooms or neighbors' homes—to gain a shadow of love, a luncheon cake or the laughter and gaiety of happy childhood. When a certain age is reached the unwelcome child is sent to school, somewhere, anywhere, where the hypocrite mother, the vampire of a child's soul, heart and body, will not be hampered or annoyed with the hungry eyes of reproach, and the starving heart longing words of an unwelcome child.

Society was astonished a few weeks ago when a man of wealth and strong character and independent, though soon to wed a New Orleans society girl, asked his intended bride: "What about our children to be born from this marriage? Marriage—to me—means motherhood, family. That is my incentive to marriage?" The intended bride tried to laugh off the demanded answer. Evasion was silenced with stern words.

This bride now understands that when she vows the marriage sacrament that there will be a principle, a soul, a God in her marriage, above the hypocritical principles of society women, who speak no feeling but self, no object of marriage but sloth and the pander of society ambitions and the feast and fat that cut the vitals of motherhood! into utter abhorrence for a baby's suckling mouth and soft caress.

The science of thought of every man's mind, who thinks of love and marriage, is the pride of fatherhood. To wilfully and knowingly deny this right of marriage makes the wife an embezzler, and obtains a husband under false pretenses and communications of love. The American marriages demand honest justice of implied obligation. Society women feel a repudiation and speak defiant words against the true meaning of marriage. Such scorn of God's law dishonors and shames women. It is this scorn and defiance that curses children before they are born and makes the divorce scandals that give a child three fathers or more with a court's decree of separation, and a quick rotation of marriage ceremonies.

WHAT THE CAUSE

AN EXPLANATION BY WEATHER FORECASTER FOSTER.

MOVEMENTS OF PLANETS

Jupiter Is Now Forty Million Miles Nearer the Sun Than It Was Six Years Ago—Their Relation to the Earth—Increased Magnetic Activity.

Mr. J. L. Waite, editor-in-chief of the Burlington (Iowa) Hawk-Eye, one of the leading daily papers of the middle west, writes me as follows:

"That was a most excellent record of forecasts you made for April. Few people believed we would have such a cold stormy April. I am afraid your other predictions is going to come true that we will not have as good crops this year as for several years past. It would interest the public very much if you could tell them upon what basis you made the forecast. What were the conditions which brought about these results, so different from what they were last year? Congratulating you upon your success, I am, etc."

As I see it the planet Mars is the immediate cause. For the past three months the earth has been moving rapidly toward that planet and this approach of the two planets caused the electric forces and the magnetic system of the earth to be excited.

My theory is that the planets are great magnets, and the great magnetician, Clerk Maxwell, demonstrated that two natural magnets caused to approach each other, break up or change the magnetic systems of each other. As I see it the electrical currents and their accompanying magnetic spirals, operating at right angles to those currents, constitute the forces that dominate in the highs and lows, these currents being connected with the earth's magnetic poles and the latter with the magnetic systems of the sun, moon and other planets.

The moon has a very weak magnetic system, so much so that the earth's magnetic system dominates, causing the moon to be as a block of copper is to a magnet. Move the magnet toward the copper and magnetic currents are set up in the latter. Move the magnet away from the copper and currents are set up in the latter in the opposite direction.

Therefore when the earth receives an electric charge from a planet that charge overflows to the moon at the first magnetic connection between the earth and moon. Then, when the earth loses its overcharge to the sun or to a planet, the moon, in order to keep up the magnetic equilibrium, empties into the earth at the next magnetic connection. The moon, therefore, is a neutral body, an electro-dynamo, and acts as an overflow reservoir for the earth, having somewhat the relation of a governor to an engine.

The giant of the worlds, the great planet Jupiter, is now forty million miles nearer the sun than it was six years ago; Saturn is at its equinox where it forms its magnetic connection

with the sun, and Mars is nearer the earth than for fifteen years. These relations cause an increased magnetic activity, the latter causes extremes of temperature, one of these extremes having occurred in April and the other will come in June.

These causes also have some relations to the tornadoes and other radical weather events and also a relation to sunspots and earthquakes.
