CHARTER

OF THE CLEAR CREEK LUMBER COMPANY.

United States of America, State of Louisiana, Parish of Caddo: Be it known that on this 29th day of October in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and nine, before me, F. A. Blanchard, a notary public in and for said parish and State, duly commissioned and qualified, on this day personally came and appeared A. L. Franklin, S. H. Bolinger and B. H. Bolinger, each of whom declared unto me in the presence of the hereinafter named and undersigned competent witnesses, that availing themselves of the laws of the State of Louisiana relative to the formation of corporations, they do hereby organize themselves into and create a corporation, and adopt the following articles as the charter thereof to govern themselves and such others as may become associated with or succeed them.

ARTICLE I.

The name and title of said corporation is **THE CLEAR CREEK LUMBER COMPANY.**

ARTICLE II.

Its domicile is declared to be in the City of Shreveport, Parish of Caddo, and State of Louisiana.

ARTICLE III.

The duration of said corporation shall be a period of ninety-nine years from the date hereof.

ARTICLE IV.

The purposes for which said corporation is established and the nature of the business to be carried on by it are: To buy and sell timber lands; to manufacture, buy and sell lumber; to buy, build and operate saw and planing mill plants, railroads, telegraph and telephone lines and to conduct a general merchandise business; and to do all things connected with or incident to any or all of said purposes.

ARTICLE V.

Every citation or other legal process shall be served upon the president, and in his absence on the secretary-treasurer.

ARTICLE VI.

The amount of capital stock of this corporation which this corporation is authorized to issue is one hundred thousand (\$100,000.00) dollars, divided into two thousand shares of the par value of fifty (\$50.00) dollars each. This corporation is authorized to commence business as such when eight hundred (800) shares of its capital stock shall have been subscribed and paid for. No certificate of stock shall be issued until full payment is made therefor, which may be by money, property, services or any other valuable consideration moving to said corporation; and a resolution of the board of directors of this corporation that the consideration given for any stock is fair and adequate shall be conclusive evidence that it is such; but no stock shall be issued for less than the par value thereof. The remaining stock shall be placed on the market at such times and in such blocks as the majority of the stockholders deem for the best interests of the corporation, the existing stockholders in all cases being allowed sixty days within which to purchase the same at par in the proportion of their holdings by preference over all other purchasers.

ARTICLE VII.

The board of directors of this corporation shall be composed of not less than five stockholders, who shall be elected at each annual meeting of the stockholders for the ensuing year; the board of directors shall have authority to adopt a set of by-laws for the regulation of the business of this corporation, to adopt a corporate seal, to hypothecate or dispose of any portion of the property of said corporation for such consideration and on such terms of payment as it may deem advisable; to direct and control the officers and employees of the corporation; to pass all rules and regulations which it may deem necessary for the conduct of the affairs of said corporation; and to vest in a general manager by resolution all or any part of the powers given by this charter to the board of directors.

ARTICLE VIII.

The officers of this corporation until the first annual meeting of the board of directors on the fifteenth day of January 1911, are: S. H. Bolinger, president; B. H. Bolinger, vice president; and A. L. Franklin, secretary-treasurer, who shall constitute its first board of directors. At the end of their term of office the officers of said corporation shall be elected by the board of directors. The regular annual meeting of the stockholders shall be held on the fifteenth of January of each year.

ARTICLE IX.

No stockholder of this corporation shall ever be held liable or responsible for the contracts or faults thereof in any further sum than the unpaid balance due the company on the shares of stock subscribed for or owned by him; nor shall any mere informality in organization have the effect of rendering this charter null or of exposing any stockholder to any liability beyond the unpaid balance, if any, on his stock.

ARTICLE X.

In the event of the dissolution of this corporation by expiration of time or by resolution of its stockholders passed in accordance with law, the stockholders

shall elect from among their number two liquidators to dispose of the assets of the corporation, pay its debts and distribute the remainder of the proceeds among the stockholders according to instructions to be given them by the stockholders at the meeting appointing them. When said liquidators shall have completed their duties, they shall prepare and file a process verbal of same, have it recorded in the mortgage records of Caddo Parish, and give notice thereof by registered mail to each stockholder.

Thus done and passed at Shreveport, Louisiana, in the presence of B. D. Terry and B. F. Oneal Jr., competent witnesses, who herewith sign as such, together with said appearers and me, notary, on the day and date first hereinabove written.

CHARTER

OF NEW SOUTH LAND COMPANY.

State of Louisiana, Parish of Caddo: Be it remembered that on this the 17th day of November 1909, before me, John D. Wilkinson, a notary public for and in said Parish and State, personally came and appeared Wilbur A. Jones and George E. Gilmer, residents of said Parish and State, and Ed. D. Stuart, a resident of the City of DeQueen, Arkansas, who stated and declared to me, notary, that availing themselves of the Constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana, they have formed and do by these presents form themselves, as well as such others as may hereafter become associated with them, into a corporation and body politic under the name and for the purposes hereinafter stated and have adopted as their charter and act of incorporation the following, to-wit:

ARTICLE I.

The name and title of this corporation shall be "NEW SOUTH LAND COMPANY," with its domicile at the City of Shreveport, in the Parish of Caddo, and under its corporate name it shall have and enjoy succession for a period of twenty-five years, unless sooner dissolved as hereinafter provided. All legal process shall be served on its president, or in his absence on the vice president, at the office of the company at its domicile.

ARTICLE II.

The purposes for which this corporation is established, and the nature of the business to be carried on by it is hereby declared to be to buy and sell lands, timber and lumber, to manufacture and sell lumber, either at wholesale or retail; to acquire and operate saw and planing mills; to construct, own and operate tram roads, logging roads and dry kilns, and to do all things pertaining to the saw mill business; to conduct a general merchandise business and to buy, operate, cultivate, lease and sell real estate, urban or rural, wherever situated; to bore or drill oil or gas wells; to construct, own and operate reservoirs or other receptacles for oil or gas or means for oil or gas transportation; to buy and sell oil and to conduct all manner of business necessary to the carrying out of these purposes.

ARTICLE III.

The capital stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00), divided into five hundred shares of the par value of one hundred dollars each, and said shares of stock shall be issued only for cash, services or property received by the company before the issuance of said shares, and this corporation shall commence business whenever forty thousand (\$40,000.00) dollars of said capital is subscribed and paid for.

ARTICLE IV.

The affairs of this corporation shall be managed by a board of directors consisting of three stockholders, who shall be elected annually on the first Monday in January of each year at a stockholders meeting held for that purpose after written notice to each stockholder addressed to him at his post-office address through the mails; any vacancy occurring in the board of directors shall be filled by the remaining directors electing another stockholder for such vacancy. Until an election is held in January 1910 the following stockholders shall constitute a board of directors: Wilbur A. Jones, who shall be president; Ed. D. Stuart, who shall be vice president, and George E. Gilmer, who shall be secretary. The board of directors shall hold their offices until another board of directors is elected and installed.

ARTICLE V.

This charter may be amended or this corporation dissolved by a vote of three-fourths of the stock at a meeting called for that purpose in accordance with the laws of the State of Louisiana. When dissolved, whether by limitation or by act of the stockholders, its affairs shall be liquidated and settled by one liquidator selected by the stockholders, who shall perform such service and have such powers relating to the liquidation of this corporation as may be delegated to him by the stockholders of this corporation.

ARTICLE VI.

This corporation shall have the power to sue and be sued; to own both real and personal property; to lease, mortgage or dispose of any of its property as its board of directors may determine, to appoint such managers, directors and officers as their interests may require, and the same to be discharged at pleasure, and to make and establish such by-laws for the proper management of the affairs of the corporation as may be necessary and proper.

ARTICLE VII.

No stockholder of this corporation shall ever be held liable or responsible for the contracts or faults thereof in any further sum than the unpaid balance due to the company on the shares of stock owned by him, nor shall any mere informality in organization have the effect of rendering this charter null or exposing any stockholder to any liability beyond the amount of his stock.
