AN ORDINANCE.

Be it ordained by the Police Jury of Caddo Parish, Louisiana, in regular session convened, that that certain road or servitude hereinbelow described is hereby declared to be a public highway of Caddo Parish, said road being forty (40) feet in width, having been acquired by the open and public possession and use thereof for the space of more than ten years and which is described as follows: Beginning at Oil City and running practically west to corner of Charlie Davis's field, then southwest to line of section nine (9) township 20, range 16, near Jeems Bayou Hunting and Fishing Club house.

Mr. Wynn moved the adoption of the above ordinance and that the road designated be declared a public road. Carried.

By Mr. Scott: That each juror furnish the Police Jury with a description of the several roads in his ward by next meeting of the Jury. Carried.

A CLEAN CITY

Commissioner Atkins a Busy Man—He and His Assistants Striving to Educate the People to "Keep Shreveport Clean"—An Ordinance and Its Requirements.

Commissioner Atkins of the Department of Streets and Parks and his assistants are being kept busy in their efforts to "keep Shreveport clean."

An ordinance of the city provides the disposition of garbage and refuse matter as follows:

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Shreveport in regular session convened, that the occupants of all buildings in the city of Shreveport where there exists or is produced any garbage, be and they are required to maintain on their premises adequate receptacles or cans with a top proof against entry of flies and shall keep the same closed; such receptacles or cans shall be constructed of tin, sheet or corrugated iron, and shall not be of such a size as when full to be of greater weight than one hundred pounds, and placed about the premises so as to be easily accessible to the collecting wagon; that the existence about the premises of garbage, except when so placed in such receptacle, is declared to be a nuisance and prohibited. The term "garbage" shall be construed to be household or kitchen refuse or refuse matter not excrementitious or liquid, composed of animal or vegetable substances, including dead fowls and animals, except cows, horses, mules, dogs and goats. That the occupants of every residence shall likewise provide themselves with a receptacle, placed in a convenient location on the premises to be reached by the hauling wagon, in which he shall place all tin cans, broken crockery, bottles and glassware, ashes, sweepings, rags and scraps. It shall be unlawful to place anything except garbage as above defined in the garbage cans or to place garbage in the receptacles provide for other substances, and it shall be unlawful to place in either receptacle, to be hauled by the city, any paper, pasteboard or wooden boxes, articles of wood, excelsior, straw or wrapping or packing material of any character, brush, trimmings of trees, bushes, vines or leaves. All factories and business houses shall dispose of their own refuse matter at their own expense.

Be it further ordained, etc., That any person violating the provisions hereof, or failing to comply herewith, shall be fined in a sum not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$10.00, and in default of payment shall be ordered to work some out on the streets of the city at the rate of \$1.00 per day, and each day on which this ordinance may be violated or remain uncomplied with, shall constitute a separate offense.

Be it further ordained, etc., That this ordinance shall take effect on its promulgation and that all ordinances in conflict hereto, are repealed.

This ordinance is being circulated on post cards which are for hanging in office or residence with instructions as follows:

It is unlawful to place in any of the streets of the city of Shreveport any stones, bricks or pieces thereof, pieces of wire, wood or metal of any kind, bones, weeds, grass, vegetables, rags, shrunken limbs, leaves, dead cats, rats, dogs or other animals, ordure or offal.—Page 124 Revised Ordinances, adopted March 20, 1906.

It is unlawful for any person hauling dirt, sand, brick, stone, gravel, old lumber, glass bottles, wire, tacks, nails, tin cans, timber and waster rubbish of any kind to permit any portion of the same to fall upon the paved streets or alleys of any portion of the city of Shreveport.—Page 205. Ordinance adopted July 9, 1907.

It is unlawful to use any part of the sidewalks of the city of Shreveport as stands for exhibit or sale of goods or merchandise.—Page 208. Ordinance enacted January 23, 1902.

It is unlawful to erect or maintain any barb wire fences in the city of Shreveport.—Page 209. Ordinance adopted March 9, 1893.

It is unlawful for any cab, omnibus, carriage, coach, dry, delivery wagon or other vehicle to stand longer than twenty minutes on any paved street between the west line of Common street and east line of Spring street.—Page 226. Ordinance enacted March 9, 1910.

It is unlawful to obstruct streets and alleys with building material.—Page 121. Ordinance adopted November 14, 1907.

MASS MEETING TONIGHT

A Plan Devised to Secure and Promote Industrial Enterprises.

A mass meeting is scheduled to be held in the court house tonight. The hour fixed for the opening is 7:30 o'clock.

At this meeting all citizens of Shreveport are invited. The Caucasian is not familiar with the details of the plan, but has been advised that it is for the purpose of enlisting the co-operation of all the citizens in the development of industrial enterprises.

The gentlemen who are connected with the promoters of this projected development give the assurance that "it is all right" and that no loss can be sustained by any one who would invest in lots which are to be offered for sale, according to a plan which will be fully explained at the meeting tonight.

For years we have been clamoring for factories and for industrial enterprises, and through the proposed promotion of this enterprise is offered to Shreveport the opportunity long sought for. Let there be a full meeting. Let the people come and hear what is to be said and proposed. The Caucasian's representative will be present to note what is to be proposed and will then inform its readers accordingly.

If "it's a good thing," and "is all right," the Caucasian will do so, and if it is not the Caucasian will also say so.

ATTORNEY BEATTIE

His Refused the Request of Attorney General to Resign—Will Remain in Office as Long as He Can.

The Times-Democrat's special from Washington of recent date says: Charlton R. Beattie, United States district attorney at New Orleans, has refused to obey the request of the Attorney General that he resign, and has notified the Department of Justice that he intends to stick. Mr. Wickersham can do what he wants to do in the case, but Mr. Beattie will stay by his guns as long as possible.

No action had been taken late yesterday, but it was said the usual custom followed in such cases was to send the nomination of a successor to the Senate. Mr. Beattie's removal would be accomplished by the confirmation of his successor.

The department believes that District Attorney Beattie would consider his resignation a public apology for his recent criticism of the Attorney General's decision in the New Orleans clearing house cases.

The offending interview which Beattie gave out to a New Orleans newspaper, soon after a grand jury ruled to return conspiracy indictments against the New Orleans Clearing House Association, was brought to Mr. Wickersham's attention only a day or two ago and his request for Beattie's resignation followed at once.

Although Attorney General Wickersham is not ready to admit that Mr. Beattie is to be separated from the government service, Armand Romain and Assistant District Attorney Wakenspack have let it be known that they aspire to fill the prospective vacancy. The latter was a candidate at the time Beattie was appointed, but he got the support of neither faction of Louisiana Republicans.

Mr. Romain, it is believed, stands a better chance of getting the endorsement of National Committeeman Wight than any other member of the regular black and tan faction. As to Frank Williams and the position he will take in the event Romain's candidacy becomes as formidable as it is believed it will, there is little speculation. It is figured he will be busy with custom house matters when the district attorneyship is settled.

UNITED STATES COURT

Has Adjourned from Alexandria to Lake Charles.

The Times-Democrat's special from Alexandria January 24 says: The United States District Court adjourned this afternoon. The judge and court officials will go to Opelousas tomorrow to hold court. The following cases were disposed of today: Seymour Joseph, youth charged with opening letters while serving in the capacity of special delivery letter carrier in this city, sentenced to two years in the National Training School in Washington City; H. K. Wiley, formerly assistant postmaster at Bozley, La., pleaded guilty to the charge of embezzling postal funds, sentenced to two years imprisonment in the Federal penitentiary in Atlanta, Ga.; Jas. Johnson, negro, charged with robbing post-office at Boatner, Jackson parish, pleaded guilty, sentenced to eighteen months in the Atlanta penitentiary.

ADLER'S SENTENCE

Judge Grubb Gives No Intimation of His Intent.

New Orleans Picayune Jan. 25: The Adler case will have another inning in the United States Court today, when it is expected that the attorneys for the defense will file their formal motion for a new trial, and will probably argue it. That being overruled, the next step will be a stay of sentence, and if the court overrules that, then the sentence will be imposed.

Judge Grubb has given no one any intimation as to what kind of a sentence he will impose when the case reaches that stage, and it is not likely that any intimation will come from him until the very moment he pronounces it from the bench. Upon that sentence will depend all future action in the case.

AGAINST NEW ORLEANS

President Taft and the Trans-Continental Railroads.

A special from Washington says: Notwithstanding his previous promise to various New Orleans representatives to remain neutral, Taft's interference in the exposition contest may prove a serious menace to New Orleans' hopes, as also the tremendous activities being exerted by the transcontinental railroads and their eastern connections. The Pennsylvania railroad system showed its hand yesterday in bringing about a meeting of several members of the Pennsylvania delegation.

The result is not announced, but it is said to contemplate the unanimous support of the Keystone State congressmen for San Francisco. The Senate committee on industrial arts and expositions this morning agreed to allow a hearing Thursday and Friday on a bill similar to the Kahn resolution, although California wanted immediate action. Senator Foster is to introduce in the Senate immediately upon convening a bill, the duplicate of the Estopinal measure, and the fight in the Senate will be along the same lines as in the House.

JEFFERSON DAVIS

Monument Unveiling Ceremony in New Orleans.

Times-Democrat Jan. 25: The Jefferson Davis Monument Association held its annual meeting yesterday afternoon in Memorial Hall, when the programme for the unveiling ceremonies February 22 was announced. The officers serving for several years were returned to their positions, as were the members of the board of directors. Congratulations on the success of their efforts to build a monument to President Davis in this city were informally extended by the Stonewall Jackson Chapter, and by New Orleans Chapter No. 72.

The officers of the association are Mrs. W. J. Behan, president; Mrs. Alden McLellan, first vice president; Mrs. Sumpter Turner, second vice president; Mrs. George H. Tichenor, corresponding secretary; Mrs. John G. Harrison, recording secretary; Mrs. C. S. Childress, financial secretary, and Mrs. J. F. Spear, treasurer.

The board of directors consists of Gen. J. B. Levert, Capt. B. T. Walsh, Col. John Holmes, Col. J. B. Simmott, Nicholas Bauer, W. O. Hart, Dr. George H. Tichenor, Capt. James Dinkins, Capt. Lewis Guion and Mr. Sumpter Turner.

BROTHER AGAINST BROTHER.

New Orleans Picayune Jan. 25: The horrifying story came over the wires a few nights ago to the effect that two brothers, aged 70 and 75 years, met in a roadway in Mississippi and fought until one was shot and killed. The brothers quarreled about some political differences which they had some four years previously, and notwithstanding the length of time which had elapsed, their enmity never cooled, they remained bitter, and when they encountered each other the other day, it meant fight to the death. There isn't an office within the gift of the people worth staining one's hands with the blood of a brother for, and shocking as is the news from our sister State, it is earnestly to be hoped that a recurrence of it will never again darken the pages and progress of fair Mississippi, whose citizenship is a credit to the State, the Nation and the neighbors.


