WEATHER BULLETIN

FORECAST OF STORMS TO CROSS THE CONTINENT.

LOWER TEMPERATURES

Tropical Hurricanes Expected Soon After September 17, but Storms May Not Be Severe, Just Enough to Cause Cooler Weather.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 16.—Last bulletin gave forecasts of disturbance to cross the continent September 15-16, warm wave 14 to 18, cool wave 17 to 21. The week of this disturbance will average cooler than usual. Beginning with showers or threatening rain most of the week will be fair. Severe storms on the continent and tropical hurricanes about or soon after September 17 may be expected, but these tropical storms are not expected to be severe, just intense enough to cause cool weather on the continent.

The next disturbance will reach the Pacific coast about September 20, cross Pacific slope by close of 21, great central valleys 22 to 24, eastern sections 25. Warm wave will cross the Pacific slope about September 26, great central valleys 22, eastern sections 24. Cool wave will cross the Pacific slope about September 23, great central valleys 25, and eastern sections 27.

This will be the greatest disturbance of the month, and by herdsman, sailors, farmers, hunters will be called the equinoctial storm. The temperatures will go high while the low approaches from the westward and in middle latitudes the temperatures will go to the frost line when the high center shall have arrived. Not much rain. The rain wave will cross west of the Rockies about September 24, great central valleys 26, eastern sections 28.

The tropical storms mentioned above will increase in force as this last above described disturbance crosses the continent, and as the two disturbances combine near the Atlantic coast the compound storm will be more severe than were the separate storms.

I expect to have my rainfall and temperatures for 1913 worked out by the last of October, and will then work out 1914. I use the astronomical calculations of the naval observatory, and they are published only three years in advance; therefore it will be inconvenient to work out the weather conditions more than three years in advance.

This year, 1911, the number of sun spots is small, generally of small intensity and not large. I expect moderate sun spots south of the sun's center near October 16 to 19. I give double date for the reason that a double cause will bring on the spots. More important spots may be expected November 24 near the center of the sun's face or photosphere.

The November 24 sun spots will have an important bearing on the theory that a relation exists between sunspots, epidemics and contagious diseases. This theory has long been advocated, and some good evidences produced. Watch the reports of epidemics and contagious diseases following the November 24 sun spots. If this theory should be established then it will be more important to be able to forecast sun spots. This I can do much better than I can forecast the weather.

I also expect earthquakes not far from November 24, but can not locate them. Severe storms on the continents and on the tropical seas may be expected at that time.

A Michel Demonstration.

Would-be Governor John T. Michel's friends held a grand rally at Donaldsonville yesterday. Delegations from every section of the State centered at Donaldsonville. From Shreveport there was a delegation of citizens who jubilated with their friend Michel. It was a great demonstration and most enthusiastic.

Cotton Region Bulletin.

Scattered light to moderate showers have occurred at a few places in Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia and the Carolinas while fair weather has been generally reported in other parts of the cotton belt. Above normal temperatures have continued to prevail over the middle and western sections.

The Grand Jury.

The Grand Jury has been summoned to convene on Monday, October 9, at 12 o'clock.

Municipal Ownership.

The municipal ownership of the public utilities wherever tested intelligently have been profitable to the communities where these prevail. The strongest opposition to municipal ownership comes from the corporations which have been obtaining money from the revenue obtained from the consumers of light, gas or of water. These opponents of municipal ownership, as evidenced from the records, exert a great influence over the political bodies of the municipalities, which they frequently control, in defiance of the will of the people. But such power is being minimized and neutralized in all the communities operating under the system of government by commission.

From a review of facts it is proven that the profits from electric light plants managed efficiently are the greatest of revenue producers.

The opposition which is being experienced in Shreveport is but a repetition of the happenings in the communities which have had to wring from an unwilling and a defiant opposition what they now possess and which would not be exchanged for the old system.

If the citizens of Shreveport would profit from the experience of such communities and reap all the advantages and all the benefits that are derived from municipal ownership of public utilities, the issue of municipal electric lighting will be settled at the election fixed for October 17.

As a progressive community, Shreveport can not discredit itself by voting against the proposed issue of bonds for a municipal electric lighting plant.

Every director is expected to be accompanied by five men, as announced in the circular letter. If each director responds, there will be an aggregation of three hundred men in the party.

Infantile Paralysis in Red River Parish.

It has been reported from Coushatta that there are from six to ten cases of infantile paralysis in the Parish of Red River. The first case appeared last winter. The disease has attacked only very young children to date, and seems to be in most cases mild. No fatalities have occurred yet. These cases seem to be sporadic. They are in widely separated portions of the parish and no connection can be traced between them. No special precautions have been taken to prevent the spread of the disease.
