

What is Death? By Rev. Geo. Croly.

What is death? 'Tis to be free; No more to weep, or joy, or fear; To join the dread equality; All, all alike are humble there—

The mighty wave Wraps lord and slave; No pride, nor poverty dares come Within that refuge-house, the tomb.

Spirit of the drooping wing, And the ever-weeping eye, Thou of all Earth's kings art king; Empires at thy foot-stool lie—

Before thee stand The wondrous hand, Birds, heroes, ages, side by side, Who darkened nations when they died.

Keep it before the People!

That Millard Fillmore has distinctly disavowed the slightest wish or desire to interfere with the question of slavery in the United States.

Keep it also before the people, that Lewis Cass proclaimed in his place in the Senate, that he would have voted for the wilnot proviso, had it been brought forward during the session of 1846.

Keep it before the people, that Millard Fillmore is denounced by the Abolitionists as a traitor and a dough-face, because he recognises the institution of slavery, and brought a bill into congress to pay a master the value of a runaway slave.

Keep it also before the people, that Gen. Cass boasts that he never was a slave-holder, that he detests slavery, and would be delighted to see it abolished, if it could be done safely and peaceably.

Keep it before the people, that the Democratic papers dare not inform their readers that Millard Fillmore voted in favor of the first of the Atherton resolutions, which declares that Congress has no jurisdiction over the question of slavery in the United States.

Keep it also before the people, that Gen. Cass has proclaimed the monstrous opinion that the question of slavery in the newly acquired territory must be settled by the people thereof; thus giving to the Indians, Mesozoos, Zamboos, and other colored inhabitants of such territory, the right and power to exclude citizens of the South from establishing themselves with their property on the soil.

Keep it before the people, that Millard Fillmore has always been a frank, open and consistent politician, that he has not two sets of opinions one for the North and the other for the South; that he does not, like Van Buren, boast of being "a northern man with southern principles," nor make professions at the eleventh hour to gull the South.

Keep it also before the people, that southern democrats are endeavoring to hold up Lewis Cass as "a Northern man with Southern principles," just as they did Van Buren, and that Lewis Cass is aiding to propagate the fraud, by causing to be circulated two editions of his life, one intended to reconcile slave-holders to his support, and the other to ingratiate himself with Northern anti-slavery men.

Keep it also before the people, that Lewis Cass never was regarded in any other light than as a violent opponent of slavery and a recognized champion of the Wilnot proviso, and that he only modified his opinions when he became the candidate for the Presidency; that even now he has never written or uttered one syllable against the principle of the Proviso; and that when interrogated by his northern friends on the subject, he pretends that the noise and confusion prevented him from explaining his views.

Keep it before the people, that Mr. Yancy, a Southern democrat, and delegate from Alabama to the national democratic convention, refused to sustain Lewis Cass, pronouncing him a political weathercock, "all things unto all men, an Abolitionist at heart, and false to the South."

WHO WILL ACCEPT?

I can prove that General Cass was in favor of the Wilnot Proviso up to December last.

I challenge the friends of General Cass to prove that his present position on the slavery question is not constitutionally more false, and in application infinitely more hostile and dangerous to the rights of the South than the Wilnot Proviso itself.

I can prove that General Cass is opposed to removing the rafts, snags, or bars, from the great rivers which form the highway of our internal commerce.

I challenge the friends of General Cass to prove that he has not been in favor of a system of internal improvements, and that his present position and doctrines have not been repudiated by a majority of the Democrats of the House of Representatives.

I can prove that General Cass was never elected to but one office by the voice of the people directly expressed.

I challenge the friends of General Cass to prove that he has not given his support to every administration for the last forty years.

I can prove that General Cass has drawn more than three hundred thousand dollars, regular pay and extra compensation, from the public treasury through executive patronage.

I challenge the friends of General Cass to prove that he did not report a bill to the Senate of the United States, reducing the pay of the volunteers for clothing from \$350 to \$250, whilst he himself was drawing eight dollars per day at the same time.

I can prove that General Cass voted for a law, while Governor and member of the Board of Michigan Territory, making it the duty of his officers to take up poor white men, and sell or whip them at discretion.

I challenge the friends of General Cass to rebut the evidence I am prepared to adduce, that he acted with the Black Cockade Federalists up to 1800.

I can prove that General Taylor is a better citizen—a better soldier—a better statesman—and a better Democrat than General Cass.

POLICE JURY.

PARISH OF IBERVILLE. ON Monday the 5th day of June, 1848, it being the day appointed for a regular session, the Police Jury met according to law and adjournment and the following members were present, to-wit: Mr. Paulin Dupuy, President and member from the 3d. District.

Mr. John Mitchelltree, member from the 6th District. Then came Mr. W. R. Boote, who having produced his certificate of election took his seat as member from the 5th District.

Then came Messrs. C. N. Brusle and D. R. Orillon who after presenting their respective certificates took their seats as members from the 2d and 7th Districts.

The session being opened the members aforesaid proceeded to elect a President and Mr. C. N. Brusle was unanimously elected President of the Police Jury.

Then the said members proceeded to elect a Clerk to serve for the ensuing year and Mr. Benj. Dubieux was re-elected to said office.

Two accounts amounting to \$65 00 was presented by Mr. H. Worsham for his services as Co rotor which was allowed, and the President authorized to draw, &c.

An account of \$10 00 was presented by Mr. H. Worsham for repairs done to the Parish Jail which was allowed, and the president authorized to draw, &c.

Four accounts amounting to \$32 60 was presented by Mr. H. ulivan for divers charges and repairs which was allowed, and the president authorized to draw, &c.

Then the Police Jury adjourned until the 6th day of June 1848.
