**S**ECT 1st. Be it ordained, &c., That all proprietors of Lots lying within the incorporated limits, are hereby required to have the lots drained, ditches excavated, and all obstructions removed therefrom, so as to allow the water to run off.  
 Sec. 2d. Be it, &c., That should any proprietor or lessee refuse to comply with the requirements of Sec. 1st. of this Ordinance, after the due promulgation thereof, they shall, on conviction thereof, be fined in a sum not to exceed \$10, at the discretion of the court trying the same.
