A very curious affair is, says the Sentinel of Natchez, about to occupy public attention in Belgium. In the reign of Bourgoin, in 1455, the Duke de Brabant made prisoner a nobleman named Legrain, but instead of taking his life, he was entitled to do, the Duke consented to spare it on condition of reviving all his estates and property. Legrain made over all he possessed, but stipulated that at the end of four centuries it should return to his family. The Duke made no objection. The four centuries expired in July next, and already a great many persons, representing themselves to be descendants of Legrain, are preparing to claim the property. It is believed that the claims will give rise to numerous law suits.

Bestrengthened Fire in Bayou Sara. A most disastrous conflagration broke out in Bayou Sara, on Friday night last, and before it could be checked nearly the entire town was burnt to the ground, and about \$200,000 worth of property destroyed.

brief space of time the flames became uncontrollable, and swept in the direction of the wind along the banks of the bayou. All the houses in the line of its course were consumed, and mere ashes replaced them. The course of the fire was then directed towards Market street, and finally settled in the focus of the town, utterly destroying the central block and all the property which it contained. It was impossible to arrest the sweep of the flames. Each moment it gathered strength until it became irresistible, and the people looked on in dumb amazement while the conflagration raged around them.

We cannot give the exact details of the losses, but the establishment of the following persons were burned down: A. Levy & Co., Hoffman & Co., J. Meyer & Co., the Ledger office, J. Miel, Harper & Son, Smith's Hotel, beside two coffee-houses. The house of Salvet & Co. was also destroyed, and many other buildings too numerous to mention. The warehouse of Leach & Co., on the new wharf, was amongst the first to feel the ravages of the fire. "There is not," says our informant, "a hotel, coffee-house, or warehouse left in Bayou Sara."

"He died of Brokers, Sir."

The following, from an exchange, is worthy of a place in poor Richard's Almanac: "He did not die of cholera—he died of brokers, sir," said a man to us yesterday, speaking of the death of his friend. "He projected an unwise improvement of a piece of real estate—made loans, covered himself with bonds and mortgages—and finally incurred a 'street debt' of \$2,000, which rapidly rolled up to \$30,000, and crushed the life right out of him. He borrowed Canada money on call, to be paid in current funds—got paper discounted payable in seven days in the city of New York—borrowed Ohio and Kentucky currency for one day, returnable in notes of Buffalo banks; shined him from street to street and friend to friend to keep debt ahead of him. Why, sir, I could not sit down to consult with him, or do any kind of business with the least assurance that he would not jump up suddenly to go out and give another shove to that accursed debt. The memorandum-book of his obligations was always in his bosom, and, sir, it burned to the poor man's heart. He was owned by brokers. He worked for them, lived for them, died for them. He did not die of cholera at all, sir. He died of street debt, upon which he expended his strength every week in throwing it ahead from one day to seven days."
