How Louisville was saved.

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Should the people of any community permit the specie to be made at this time an article of traffic?—This is an interesting question, and deserves the intelligent consideration of this community.

It is true that in ordinary times the freest scope should be allowed to legitimate trade, and it is only under the stringent laws of necessity that legislative enactment should trammel trade in any article of legal traffic.

This country is now in the midst of a legal revolution. The healthy laws of trade are all silenced. The ordinary demand for specie, which is the great basis of trade as well as value and circulation, is not therefore governed by those healthy laws of trade which will in ordinary times equalize and adjust and regulate themselves by the great and controlling law of "supply and demand."

Why is specie worth more in Virginia than in Louisiana? Trade between the former and latter State do not demand this. If it did it would flow in its natural channels through exchanges in payment for value received here, and while we would lose the specie we would gain in substance its equivalent. But there is no trade and we now get mere "promises to pay," either of individuals or corporations or government. We do not at all doubt the ultimate responsibility of all these "promises to pay."

pay?" How can those who make the "promises" redeem them?

It is universally conceded that the circulation of every country is healthy or unhealthy in proportion to its supply of this basis of circulation, "specie." Our Banks accordingly will be able and ready to resume specie payment, if the country is full of specie, at a much earlier day, than if it is drained. And what is much more important than all, we shall be saved from that horrible currency which is now flooding other portions of our government, in the shape of notes of less denomination than one dollar, issuing from all sorts of sources.

If then it be an evil to be avoided, to permit this section of country to be drained of specie for the supply of the border country of our government, how much more strongly do those "laws of necessity" demand that we should not permit specie to be purchased here or elsewhere which may be destined for our enemies, it matters not at what premium.

Specie is not necessary in the border States to carry on the war, because, to the praise of our patriotic people there and elsewhere, be it said, our government will buy all that specie will. If it was necessary, the response of our people to every other demand of the government gives a guarantee that they would likewise respond to this, but such is not the fact.

Is not this subject worthy the attention of the vigilance committee at this time? We disclaim any personal allusion, but only desire to throw out these suggestions for the benefit of those whose duty it is to investigate.

NOTICE.

BEING appointed Receiver under the provisions of the act of the Confederate States of America, entitled "An Act for the Sequestration of the Estates, Property and Effects of Alien Enemies, &c.," for the section of the State comprising the parishes of Caddo, De Soto, Sabine, Bossier, Calhoun and Bienville, and for which the Confederate Court holds sessions at Shreveport. Therefore, all parties having business with the office will confer a favor by communicating their information in writing, as far as practicable, stating names of aliens, their domicils, nature of property, where situated, supposed value, and their own residences or places of business, that they may be called on for further information, as each case comes up for examination.

Fear has been expressed that peremptory demand will be made for payments of debts due to aliens, and summary means used in confiscating their property to the great detriment of the community. This is a great mistake. The Receiver will not willingly throw any impediment in the way of business, but hopes, in every instance, to secure the rights of the Government without the least detriment to private interests, and as much as possible without litigation.

Let an honorable loyalty be evinced in assisting the Receiver in establishing these rights. Meet him with an honest intention to do no wrong, and you may feel full assurance that every facility, as urgently demanded by the exigencies of the times, will be extended in return.

For the information of the public, I publish the second and third sections of the act:

Sec. 2. Be it further enacted, That it is and shall be the duty of each and every citizen of the Confederate States speedily to give information to the officers charged with the execution of this law, of any and every lands, tenements and hereditaments, goods and chattels, rights and credits, within this Confederacy, and of every right and interest therein held, owned, possessed or enjoyed by or for any alien enemy, as aforesaid.

Sec. 3. Be it further enacted, That it shall be the duty of every attorney, agent, former partner, trustee or other person holding or controlling any such lands, tenements or hereditaments, goods or chattels, rights or credits, or any interest therein, of any such alien enemy, speedily to inform the Receiver, hereinafter provided to be appointed, of the same, and to render an account thereof, and, so far as practicable, to place the same in the hands of such Receiver; whereupon such person shall be fully acquitted of all responsibility for property and effects so reported and turned over. And any such person wilfully failing to give such information and render such account, shall be guilty of a high misdemeanor, and upon indictment and conviction shall be fined in a sum not exceeding five thousand dollars, and imprisoned not longer than six months—said fine and imprisonment to be determined by the court trying the case—and shall further be liable to be seized by said Confederate States, and subjected to pay double the value of the estate, property or effects of the alien enemy held by him so subject to his control.
