Postal Affairs of the Confederate States.

TRIPS WE RESERVE THE PROPERTY OF THE PROPERTY

AN ACT, to be entitled an act to prescribe the rates of postage in the Confederate States of America, and

for other purposes.
SECTION 1. The Congress of the Confederate States of America do enact, That from and after such period as the Postmaster General may by procla-mation announce, thereshall be charged the following rates of postage, to-wit: For every single letter sealed and for every letter in manuscript or paper of any kind upon which infor-mation shall be asked for, or commu-nicate in writing, or by marks or signs conveyed in the mail for any distance between places within the Confedrate States of America, not exceeding 500 miles, 5 cents; and for any distance exceeding 500 miles, double that rate; and every letter or parcel not exceding half an ounce in weight, shall be deemed a single letter, and every ad-ditional weight of half an ounce or ad-ditional weight less than half an ounce shall be charged with an additional single postage; and all packages containing other than printed or written matter, and money packages in-cluded in this class, shall be rated by be charged double the rates of postage foregoing cases the postage must be prepaid by stamps; and all letters office Department, which shall hereafter be advertised as "Sec 4. > That it shall be the duty of every Postmaster to cause to be defaced in such manner as the Postmaster General shall direct, all postage stamps of this Confederacy to letters deposited in his office for delivery or to be sent by mail; and if any Postmaster sending letters in the mail with such postage stamps attached shall omit delivery, to deface the stamps and report the delinquent Postmaster to the Postmaster General. And if any person shall use, or attemp' to use, in prepayment of postage, any postage stamps which shall have been before


