

NOTICE.





NEWS ABBREVIATED.

FIGHT IN KENTUCKY!

MEMPHIS, Nov. 8.—The Appeal's Extra of to day contains a full account of a hard fought and bloody battle at Colenlins yesterday, between Pillow's brigade, 2500 strong, composed of Tupper's Arkansas regiment, and Freeman's, Wright's, and Pickett's Tennessee regiment. They encountered the enemy on the Missouri side, opposite Columbus, early on the morning of the 7th inst., 7,000 strong, under General McClelland, assisted by Gen. Bowlin.

Pillow's brigade fought gallantly until their ammunition was exhausted; then they were overwhelmed and retreated back to the river with heavy loss, where they made a stand, fighting with their bayonets. Capt. Watkins battery was temporarily lost in the retreat.

At this critical moment Gen. Cheat-ham's Brigade, composed of Smith's and Russell's Tennessee regiments, and Col. Mark's Louisiana regiment, assisted by Gen. Polk and Blythe's Mississippi regiment, arrived and carried the fortunes of the day, retaking Watson's battery, routing the enemy and pursuing them 7 miles to their boats, where their route ended in an inglorious flight. Large quantities of arms and ammunition was captured. The road was strewn with coats, guns, knapsacks, etc.

Gen. Bowlin was captured by Rev. James Rogers of Tennessee, who also took a stand of colors.

Col. Dougherty and Col. Beaufort are among the federal prisoners. Our loss is less than 200. The enemy's loss is from 500 to 800. The battle lasted nearly all day, and was terrific throughout.

The gunboats made a simultaneous attack on the Columbus batteries.—We lost several gallant company officers.

Richmond Nov. 4.—A special dispatch to the Richmond Dispatch, dated Manassas to-day, announces that reliable information from Washington says that but fifteen regiments of infantry, one light battery of six guns, and a 1000 negroes are on board the Lincoln fleet.

The Federals have fallen back to their entrenchments.

Southern merchants at Alexandria have been compelled to close their stores.

Wilmington, Nov. 4.—Seventy-three prisoners arrived at Goldsborough to-day from steamer Union, and proceeded to Raleigh under a guard. It is currently reported that three transport are ashore near Georgetown, South Carolina. A part of the crews, including two negroes have been lodged in the Georgetown jail.

A gentleman who has just arrived at Manassas, states that the Baltimore Sun of Saturday reports the resignation of Seward, Blair, Cameron, Scott and McClellan. The difficulties probably grew out of an attempt to force McClellan to attack the Confederate forces.

It is currently reported there is considerable commotion in Washington and the free States, caused by the rumored resignation of General Scott, McClellan, Secretary Seward, Cameron, and other prominent officials.

A general Kilkeany cat-blight is impending throughout Lincoln-dom. Gen. Scott is reported going to Europe.

There is a rumor not generally credited, that the federals crossed the Kanawha river at Leoup Creek, to cut off Col. Jenkin's cavalry.

Jenkin's informed Floyd that if he would send him infantry, he would cut the enemy off. This was done, and it is said Jenkin killed and captured the enemy's entire force, said to be 500.

Price and McCulloch are reported to have united their forces, and were in Charton county, Mo.

McClellan assumes command of the armies of the United States. John C. Breckinridge has been appointed a Brigadier-General.
