The Situation in Missouri.—A Sedalia correspondent of the Burlington (Iowa) Hawk-Eye, after stating that Gen. Price is at Osceola, on the Osage, where he will be compelled to fight, gives the following as the programme of Gen. Halleck for annihilating the great Missouri chieftan:

The whole division of this department will move upon him from five different points at the same time.—Hunter, with his division from the West, to prevent a possibility of his going into Kansas, and thus prevent his devastating that State, or escaping in that direction. Gens. Wyman and Ashboth, from Rolla, will proceed by way of Springfield or Bolivar, to prevent his retreating South. Gen. Pope, from Syracuse, will go by way of Warsaw, and Gen. Steele's division from Sedalia. These different divisions will constitute a force of about 50,000 men, with about 4000 cavalry, and two or three powerful batteries. With this programme well executed, it will be a miracle if he should escape. As to the numbers, the two armies will probably be about equally matched.

The Little Rock Journal says that a letter from Fayetteville conveys the intelligence that Gen. Price had engaged the Yankees at Rolla and routed them. No particulars given.

A dispatch to a Northern paper, dated St. Louis, 10th inst., says:

A person, direct from Bates county, passed through Jefferson City on the 7th, for Rolla, and Reports that when near Clinton, he saw a good many wagons loaded with stores for Price's army. They were from the river counties. He states there was every evidence that the insurgents would recuperate a force south of the Osage equal at least to any heretofore raised in the State.
