The Situation in Missouri .- A Sedalia correspondent of the Burlington (Iowa) Hawk-Eye, after stating that Gen. Price is at Osceola, on the Osage, where he will be compelled to fight, gives the following as the programme of Gen. Halleck for annihilating the great Missouri chieftan:

The whole division of this department will move upon him from five different points at the same time .-Hunter, with his division from the West, to prevent a possibility of his going into Kansas, and thus prevent his devastating that State, or escaping in that direction. Gens. Wyman and Ashboth, from Rolla, will proceed by way of Springfield or Bolivar, to prevent his retreating South. Gen. Pope, from Syracase, will go by way of Warsaw, and Gen. Steele's divis-ion from Sedalia. 
A dispatch to a Northern paper, ated St. Louis, 10th inst., says:
