Jury Venire.

THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, THE STATE OF LOUISIANA, PARISH OF LAFOURCHE.

BE IT KNOWN AND REMEMBERED, that on this Twenty-ninth day of the month of January, in the year of our Lord, One thousand nine hundred, Pursuant to written notices issued by the Clerk of Court, in and for the parish of Lafourche, La., and read and given to each of the jurors, and to the grand jury, and for the said Parish, as by the said Clerk's certificate hereto annexed more fully appears, we, Henry Riviere, Jno. S. Seely, J. O. Knobloch, Alex. Theriot, Henry W. Frost, Jury Commissioners, duly appointed as such for the parish of Lafourche, under the provision of Act No. 135 of the General Assembly, approved July 13th, 1898, and promulgated by publication in the State Official Journal on July 29th, 1898, and all duly sworn and qualified as such Jury Commissioners in and for the said parish of Lafourche; met at the Clerk's Office at the Court house in the Town of Thibodaux, and in company with Charles J. Barker, Clerk of said Court, ex-officio Jury Commissioner, duly sworn and qualified as such; then there, in the presence of Messrs. J. Otis Knobloch and Emile J. Legendre, two competent and disinterested witnesses of lawful age, competent to read and write the English language, residing in the parish of Lafourche, and summoned by the Clerk of said Court for the purpose of proceeding in accordance with Section 1 of said Act No. 135 of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana of 1898, to examine the original venire list on file in the Clerk's Office, and having struck therefrom the names of such Grand Jurors and regular Jurors as have so served, as well as the names of others on the list who are known to have died, removed from the Parish, become exempt or disqualified to serve as jurors, since their names were entered thereon; and the names of those who have died, removed, become exempt or disqualified were also taken from the General Venire Box; after which we supplemented the original list and the ballots in the box, with the names of the same number of good and competent men from the qualified jurors of the Parish, as have been taken from the box and erased from the list, so as to keep the number of names in the General Venire Box and on the jury list as the original standard of three hundred contained therein; each of said names being placed in the general venire box having been written by the Clerk on a separate slip of paper, together with the number of the ward or place of residence of such person. And immediately after completing said general venire list, we selected therefrom the names of the following twenty citizens, good and competent men, possessing the qualifications to serve as grand jurors prescribed by Section 1 of said Act, taken from different parts of the Parish, as far as practicable, to serve as grand jurors at the session of court beginning on Monday, March 12th, 1900, and until discharged according to law, to-wit:

After which we proceeded, after the slips containing the general venire box had been well fixed, to draw the said general venire box, the names of thirty persons to serve as petit jurors for the first week of the session of said Court, beginning on Monday, March 12th, 1900; the names being drawn from the box one at a time by Henry Riviere, one of the said Jury Commissioners, in the presence of the other Commissioners and of the witnesses, and which names so drawn, are as follows:

Proclamation of Election.

Pursuant to public "Notice and Proclamation of Election" issued by the Commissioners of Drainage District No. 2 of the Parish of Lafourche in accordance with law, ordering that a special election be held in said district on the 16th day of January, 1900, for the purpose of levying a special tax of five mills in the dollar on all taxable property in said Drainage District No. 2 of the Parish of Lafourche for a period of ten years commencing with the year 1900, and to incur debt and issue negotiable bonds to the amount of Eleven thousand and 250 cents for a period of ten years beginning with the year of February, 1900, the said bonds to bear five per cent per annum interest, payable annually, for the purpose of continuing the drainage system in said district, and to perfect a system of drainage in said district, and that the said commission of the said drainage district should on the 16th day of January, 1900, in open session at the Court House of the Parish of Lafourche, examine and count the ballots in number and amount, examine and canvass the returns and declare the result of the election, therefore in conformity to the said Notice the undersigned commissioners of the said drainage district did on the 16th day of January met in open session at the Court House of the Parish of Lafourche and open the ballot boxes, examine and count the ballots in number and amount, examine and canvass the returns and declare the result of the said election to be as follows:

Number of votes for the five mill tax and for the proposition to incur debt and issue negotiable bonds, 253. Number of votes against the five mill tax and against the proposition to incur debt and issue negotiable bonds, 4. Amount of assessed property in favor of the five mill tax and in favor of the proposition to incur debt and issue negotiable bonds \$1847.20. Amount of assessed property against the five mill tax and against the proposition to incur debt and issue negotiable bonds \$10,815. Total vote in amount \$11,662.20.

The said proposition to levy, assess, and collect a special tax of five mills on the dollar on all taxable property in the said Drainage District No. 2 of the Parish of Lafourche for a period of ten years beginning with the year 1900, and to issue negotiable bonds to the amount of Eleven thousand Dollars, the said bonds to bear for a period of ten years commencing with the first day of February 1900, unless they be sooner called in by the said Commission, and to bear five per cent per annum interest, payable annually, having received the majority in number and amount of the vote cast at the said election, now, Therefore, by virtue of the power and authority vested in us by law, we, the undersigned Commissioners of Drainage District No. 2 of the parish of Lafourche do hereby declare and proclaim the result of the said election to be in favor of the levy of the tax and the issuance of the bonds as herein above set forth. Revenue Laws For Colonies.

A short while ago the Washington correspondent of the Picanone thus wrote to his paper:

There is a feeling about the capitol that the ways and means committee will soon declare, by majority report, that the constitution, which extends to all of the states and territories of the union uniform revenue laws, does not compel the extension of uniformity in laws to the colonial possessions. In regard to Puerto Rico, the Evening Star says:

"The administration does not want the question of discriminating revenues raised as to Puerto Rico, but wants the laws extended over that island by free grace and not a constitutional right, or as not to be committed to the same course as to the Philippines. Secretary Root's argument on the question placed the extension of the revenue laws to Puerto Rico on the ground of policy, not of constitutional construction, the plain purpose being not to tie the hands of the government when the question has to be settled with respect to the Philippines.

"If discriminating duties are placed upon commerce between Puerto Rico and the rest of the country, the question will undoubtedly be taken to the supreme court for settlement and should that court sustain the theory, which has heretofore been generally accepted, that the constitution forbids such discrimination, it would become obligatory to extend the laws of this country to the Philippines, or else to amend the constitution. But by establishing free trade with Puerto Rico, merely as a matter of policy, the necessity of determining whether such policy is obligatory under the constitution can be avoided, to be settled later, when it comes to dealing with the Philippines.

"The representatives of the several local interests that might be injuriously affected by free trade with Puerto Rico, however, are persistent in their demands for protection from competition with Puerto Rico, and it is believed by many in congress that this influence will be strong enough to compel a new construction of the constitution which will admit of different revenue laws for the islands."
