BE IT KNOWN AND REMEMBERED that on the twenty-ninth day of the month of January, in the year of our Lord, One thousand nine hundred, Pursuant to written notices issued by the Clerk of Court, in and for the parish of Lafourche, and addressed and given to each of the Jury Commissioners in and for the said Parish, as by the said Clerk's certificate hereto annexed more fully appears, the following named Jurors, to-wit: S. Seely, Jos. M. Lefort, Alex. Theriot, Henry W. Frost, Jury Commissioners, duly appointed as such for the parish of Lafourche, under the provision of Act No. 135 of the General Assembly, approved July 13th, 1898, and promulgated by publication in the State official Journal on July 29th, 1898, and all day sworn in and qualified as such Jury Commissioners in and for the said parish of Lafourche, met at the Clerk's Office at the Court House in the Town of Thibodaux, and in company with Charles J. Barker, Clerk of said Court, ex-officio Jury Commissioner, duly sworn and qualified as such; then and there, in the presence of Messrs. J. Otis Knobloch and Emile J. Legendre, two competent and disinterested witnesses of lawful age, competent to read and write the English language, residing in the parish of Lafourche, and in the presence of the Clerk of said Court for the purpose; proceeded in accordance with Section 6 of said Act No. 135 of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana of 1898, to examine the original list of names on file in the Clerk's Office, and having struck therefrom the names of such Grand Jurors and regular Jurors as have so served, as well as the names of others on the list who are known to have died, removed from the Parish, become exempt or disqualified to serve as Jurors, since their names were entered thereon; and the names of those who have died, removed, become exempt or disqualified were also taken from the general venire box; after which we supplemented the original list and added thereto the names of such persons as were on the list, with the names of the same number of good and competent men from the qualified Jurors of the Parish, as have been taken from the box and names from the list, so to keep the number of the names in the General Venire Box and on the jury list as the original standard of three hundred contained in the original venire box having been written by the said Clerk on a separate slip of paper, together with the names of the said Jurors, of the name of each of the said Jurors, and the name of the ward or place of residence of each person.

And immediately after completing said general venire list, we selected therefrom the names of the following twenty citizens, two competent men, possessing the qualifications to serve as grand jurors prescribed by Section 1 of said Act, taken from different parts of the Parish, as far as practicable, to serve as grand jurors at the session of court beginning on Monday, March 12th, 1900, and until discharged according to law, to-wit:

After which we proceeded, after the slips contained in the general venire box had been well mixed, to draw from said general venire box, the names of thirty persons to serve as petit jurors for the first week of the session of said Court, beginning on Monday, March 12th, 1900; the names being drawn from the box one at the time, by Henry Riviere, one of the said Jury Commissioners, in the presence of the other Commissioners and of the witnesses, and which names so drawn, are as follows:

Ordinance No.

Be it ordained by the Police Jury, in regular meeting assembled, that the Police Code, Ordinances and Resolutions of the Police Jury of the Parish of Lafourche, revised and digested by Thomas A. Badeaux, Attorney at Law and H. N. Coulon, Clerk of Police Jury be, and same are hereby adopted as the laws and ordinances of the Parish of Lafourche; that all laws and ordinances of the parish of Lafourche not contained in said Revision be, and same are hereby repealed, and that the said Ordinances of the Parish of Lafourche shall be considered promulgated from and after the first publication of the present ordinance in the Official Journal of the Parish.

Act No. 45 S. B. No. 3—By Mr. Coge.

JOINT RESOLUTION.

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Louisiana relative to ratifying and carrying into effect a special tax levied in the City of New Orleans for the purpose of improvements, and to establish therein public systems of sewerage and water, the issuance of bonds therefor and providing ways and means to pay the principal and interest of said bonds.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, Two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, concurring, that the following amendment to the Constitution of the State be submitted to the electors of the State at the next general election for representatives in the legislature, to be held on the Tuesday next following the third Monday in April A. D. 1900, to-wit:

Article 1. "The special tax or public improvements, and for the purpose of taxpayers of the City of New Orleans on June 6, 1899, and levied by the City Council, by Ordinance No. 15,381 approved June 24, 1899, is hereby ratified, and its validity shall never be questioned. The special act adopted by the Legislature at the Special Session held on August 8, 1899, constituting the Board of Commissioners of the City of New Orleans, authorizing the City of New Orleans to issue bonds, and providing the means to pay the principal and interest thereof, and for other purposes cognate to the purposes of the special tax aforesaid, is hereby ratified and approved, specially including the therein reserved legislative right to amend the same; and all provisions of the present Constitution in conflict with the provisions of said act, and with this amendment, are to that extent and for that purpose repealed."

Section 2. Be it further resolved, etc., That on the official ballots, to be used at said election, shall be placed the words, "For the City of New Orleans Public Improvement Amendment," and the words, "Against the City of New Orleans Public Improvement Amendment," and each elector shall indicate, as provided in the general election laws of the State, whether of the proposition "for" or "against" he votes for.

LENTEIN REGULATIONS.

Bishop Rouxel Issues the Annual Instructions.

Bishop Rouxel has issued the annual Lenten letter: from the archdiocese, which contains besides the regulations for that season, information and instructions for the benefit of the priests under his charge. In his letter the bishop says that the annual examination of young priests will take place Sept 4 and 5. A special collection will be taken up at all the masses on the first Sunday in Lent on behalf of the missions among the colored people and the Indians. On Easter will be offered the collection for the local ecclesiastical seminary, which Archbishop Chapele hopes to establish in this city next fall.

The Lenten regulations follow:

1. Every day in Lent, except Sundays, is a fasting day of obligation.
2. The use of flesh meat is allowed at the principle meal on all days, except Wednesdays and Fridays, and except Saturday, the Ember day, and the Saturday of holy week.
3. They who are dispensed from fasting may eat flesh meat at every meal on days when meat is allowed.
4. flesh meat and fish are not allowed to be used at the same meal, not even on Sundays.
5. Only one full meal in the day, after midday, or near it, is allowed.
6. A small collation may be taken in the evening, at which fish, butter, milk and eggs are allowed. When the principal meal cannot be taken at midday, the order may be reversed and the collation may be taken in the morning, the principal meal in the evening. In the preparation of food, the use of lard is allowed.
7. In the morning the drinking of coffee, tea or chocolate is not for bidden, but there is no permission to eat, unless it be so little that the law is not presumed to notice it.
8. The law of abstinence from meat is binding on all from the age of seven years, unless exempted by reason of ill health or necessity.
9. All persons twenty-one years of age are bound to fast, unless lawfully exempted. It is advisable, in case of doubt, to consult the confessor.
