The Carnival in Thibodaux.

The carnival celebration in Thibodaux is now a thing of the past. The general verdict is, that it was a success.

The festivities commenced Monday night with an illuminated bicycle parade, which, though gotten up on rather short notice, was quite creditable and afforded much amusement.

On Tuesday, Mardi Gras, the people began early coming into town, and by the time of the arrival of King Suroore an immense throng filled the streets.

The king with his retinue arrived on the Str. Louisiana at about 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon, and was greeted by the big crowd of people at the steamboat landing, who blended their cheers with the booming of the cannon and shrill piping of steam whistles.

The king and his courtiers were driven in chariots to the city hall where Mayor Zerott welcomed him in a neat speech and turned over to him the keys of the town. They were then driven through the principal streets of the town, and taken to the Strangers' Hotel, to await the night parade.

The night parade was the feature of the celebration. There were eight floats, all tastefully and artistically decorated, and representing, after the King's Chariot, the "Earth," "Air," "Water," "Ice," "Fire," the "Moon" and the "Sun," subjects well conceived and executed.

The masqueraders on the floats and on horseback were gorgeous, and the scenic effect good. The electric display made by some of the principal business houses and the illumination of private residences along the line of march added greatly to the splendor of the pageant.

At the opera house at the conclusion of the parade, the king crowned Miss Mamie Walsh, the accomplished daughter of Capt. J. M. Walsh, as Queen of the Carnival, and she chose as her maids of honor Misses Lucy Foret, Bertha Foret and Lillian Roth.

The king was Mr. T. Gordon Reddy, Jr., of Broussard, and his aids were Messrs. Frank Harmon, Ernest Thibodaux and Nic. Carriere.

The celebration ended by a ball which lasted until the small hours of the next morning.

Some Figures.

The Lafourche Comet thus concludes a review of the vote cast for judicial officers at the primaries:

"Caillouet received 686 votes in Terrebonne and Winchester 857; in Lafourche Caillouet got 1221; Winchester, 361. At the Thibodaux poll Caillouet's majority over Winchester was 118. At the Houma poll Winchester's majority over Caillouet was 115.

Major W. P. Martin, the candidate for district attorney, received in the two parishes 2354 votes.

The handsome vote given Messrs. Caillouet and Martin by their fellow-citizens in the two parishes shows that they will easily defeat the opposition at the April election. They will both be a credit to the Eighteenth Judicial District."

At the time of the primaries the registered vote of the two parishes was 4650. Of this Martin received a majority of 29. The combined vote for judge was 2826, or a majority of 800 of the registered vote. It is fair to suppose that the great bulk, if not all, of the Winchester vote will go to Judge Caillouet in the general election, that is the engagement which Democrats participating in a primary take. It would thus appear that at the conclusion reached by the Comet is well founded.

A Crowley Visitor's Impression of the Thibodaux Carnival.

Editor Sentinel:

I cannot forbear complimenting the Carnival Club of your quiet and attractive little city upon the splendid success they achieved in the celebration of mardi gras on Tuesday last. As an initial movement in the organization of a home pageant to amuse and entertain the "cat get-aways" to the carnival season in New Orleans, it is deserving of all praise and shows beyond all question that the citizens of Thibodaux have all the requisite artistic taste, culture and liberality of resources to get up carnival attractions, second only to a large city and such as will satisfy the most aesthetic taste.

I have attended several carnivals in New Orleans and witnessed several efforts at pageants in the country towns, but I must confess that I was not prepared to see such magnificent and ornate floats and splendid costumes as made up the parade on Tuesday night. I cannot better express it than to say: "It was New Orleans in miniature"—on a smaller scale but almost equal in design and splendor.

The theme—"The Elements"—earth, air, water, fire, ice, moon, sun, with "King Suroore" and his suite, was most graphically, artistically, and appropriately illustrated by eight floats with superbly costumed persons to typify each subject, was most happily conceived and successfully executed. I don't propose to attempt a detailed description of this entertaining and beautiful spectacle as that property belongs to the better capacity of your local papers which are more familiar with data and circumstances that inspired the celebration. I desire to say however, that from the arrival of his majesty, King Suroore in the boat, his reception, his triumphant procession with his loyal subjects through his capital city, the crowning of the beautiful and gracious Queen by Rex surrounded by his brilliant court and the charming make of honor, the admirable grouping and splendid scene effects in the tableaux at the Opera House, made a kaleidoscopic scene of enchanting pictures that will not soon be forgotten by the hundreds of spectators of the occasion. The beautiful decorations of the show windows, bunting flags, and the colors of his majesty, illuminated by hundreds of incandescent lights from the business houses on Main street and along the line of march on other streets, added a glamour and beauty to the scene probably never witnessed before in your city.

From what I was told there never was such a large crowd of people assembled in Thibodaux before, and the best of it was there was not an incident or accident to mar the pleasure of the occasion. Every body was in fine humor, fully en rapport with the spirit of the event and had a jolly good time.
