Discouraging Situation.

Reports from the sections of the parish where there is much potato raising are discouraging. A great quantity of potatoes rotted in the fields, due to the excessive rains. The market prices are very low, in many cases shipments not realizing enough to pay the freight.

New Orleans merchants attribute the falling of prices to bad merchandise. While this is no doubt an element in the problem, perhaps, a very serious one, it is not the sole cause of low prices.

Combinations among merchants and buyers have a more depressing effect upon the prices of small farm products than almost any other cause, and that such combinations exist is generally believed and scarcely denied.

The New Orleans dealers in farm products are playing a dangerous game in thus depressing prices. They are playing with fire, and may awake to the dangers of the situation when it will be too late to avert the consequences of its evils. It has been truly said that "necessity is the mother of invention," and the dire necessity to which our farmers are reduced by the shabby treatment they receive in the New Orleans market will drive them to seek other markets for their products, and once they find these, the likelihood is that they will bid a long adieu to New Orleans.

Let New Orleans dealers take warning in time; it is always dangerous to put human patience and endurance to an extreme test.

A Teachers' Association Organized.—A Suggestion.

We publish elsewhere the proceedings had at a meeting of the white public teachers of Thibodaux and vicinity, recently held, at which they organized themselves into an association to promote their general welfare.

Lockport has had such an association for some time past, and it is an encouraging sign to see the teachers from this end of the parish organize. The length of the parish is so great that it would be inconvenient for practical purposes, to have but one association. The two associations, while acting separately to achieve the special end in view, should yet act, in a general way, in unison, so that no spirit of rivalry or petty jealousy spring up between them to estrange them and impair their usefulness. There should be a perfect esprit de corps among the teachers, not only in the two separate associations, but also among the entire teaching corps. How best to promote this end, should be one of the problems to the correct solution of which the two associations should bend their best efforts.

The SENTINEL throws out this suggestion to the two associations, and hopes that it will be taken up and acted upon. It offers the use of its columns to the teachers for a ventilation of their views, and the development of some practical plan to carry out the idea suggested.

We regret that we do not know the air on which it is sung. Perhaps some of our old denizens who have heard it sung in the fifties may recall it.
