Rehabilitation.

The old business house, owned by Mr. Justin Badeaux, and occupied by Mr. Edward Badeaux as a grocery stand for many years past, is now vacant for the first time since 1849. Mr. Edward Badeaux having recently removed his business to Jackson street.
Mr. Clayton Badeaux, whom the SENTINEL scribe found supervising the cleaning up of the ancient brick structure preparatory to its rehabilitation by carpenters and painters, told us that during the war the federal troops after ransacking the building of goods, etc, converted it into a stable during their occupancy of town. Despite this rough usage and the constant use of the building for over fifty years, the flooring is in a remarkable state of preservation. When the repairs are finished the building will be almost new.

Death of C. C. Williams.

Mr. C. C. Williams, a prominent planter and owner of barge line at Lafourche Crossing, died at his residence on Sunside plantation, at 2:35 o'clock a. m. Friday, August 10—1900.

The remains will be brought by special train to our city at 2:30 o'clock p. m. to day, Saturday, and will be interred in St. John's cemetery after funeral services in the church.

The deceased was a gallant confederate veteran and an honored member of Braxton Bragg Camp, No. 194 of Thibodaux—the members of which will attend the funeral in a body.

Mr. Williams was a very popular and useful citizen in our parish and will be sadly missed by his friends in the business and social walks of life. The SENTINEL, in common with hosts of friends and acquaintances of deceased, tenders sincere condolence to the bereaved family.

Improvement of Streets.

Some of our public spirited citizens are discussing the expediency of circulating a subscription list to raise about \$2000, for putting shells on the principally travelled streets in town, so as to solidify the ground against the effects of continuous showers and bog holes as is now witnessed everywhere through the city limits at this time.

An abundance of shells can be procured at reasonable prices in Houma, and when our streets are properly ballasted with them, mud and bog holes will be seen no more in town.

It is understood that the amount subscribed to this laudable public object is a loan to the municipality to be reimbursed by a special tax, for said purpose, in the future.

There is no telling of the loss in trade to the business men by reason of bad roads and boggy streets for several weeks past—without considering other serious inconveniences to travel in town and country. Every citizen is interested in good streets and good roads.

Let the citizens of town take practical action for the improvement and drainage of streets, and let the police jury be asked to take up the good roads question and improve the highways in the country.

These will be proper topics for discussion at the meeting on next Thursday night. It is a good move and should be aided by every citizen.

Wife Murder.

Leon Favre, white, fired three shots into the body and instantly killed his wife, at Bruslee Labadie in this parish, at 3 o'clock, a. m. yesterday. The parties had been separated for some time owing to the brutal treatment of the husband and who had tried to kill her on a previous occasion. Favre, who had been imprisoned for some time in Napoleonville for this assault was finally released on bond. Subsequently he made overtures to his wife to return to him, but through dread of him she refused to do so. On Thursday he sent his wife word that he would call to see her for the last time on Friday—yesterday. True to his word he came and murdered her.

As soon as the news reached here early yesterday morning sheriff Beary and deputies took the blood hounds and hastened to the scene of the crime. Telegrams were also sent out to Morgan City and elsewhere for officers to be on the lookout for the murderer. As Favre was said to have taken a skiff and crossed a lake it is doubtful if the bloodhounds can track him. Up to the hour of going to press no news had been received of his capture.
