### Suicided Rather Than Surrender.

Leon Faivre, who murdered his wife early Friday morning of last week, after a few days hiding in the swamps near the scene of his crime, driven by hunger and starvation to get something to eat, called at a negro cabin on Mr. Wood's sugar plantation, near Schriever on Tuesday afternoon.

A negro woman started to the house to get Faivre—whom the man proved to be—some bread, when all at once he broke and ran into the cane field near by. Mr. Woods hurried at once and notified Deputy sheriff Tucker of Schriever of the man's strange actions, who telephoned the facts to sheriff Beary of this place. The sheriff, accompanied by his deputies, Messrs. Frost and Dupre, went down with his blood hounds. There was some difficulty at first in getting the trail, but finally Mr. Willie Webre who knew Faivre and met him in the road as he came out of the cane field hastened to the officers and gave them information of Faivre's locality.

The hounds immediately took the trail and after an hours chase through mud and water treed the fugitive in the Devil swamp, near the Price sugar plantation in this parish. Before coming in sight of the baying hounds a shot was heard which led sheriff Beary to believe that Faivre had shot one of his dogs, but as there was no more firing he and his deputies approached cautiously until they could see their man.

It was found that Faivre had deliberately tied a hangman's knot in a rope, secured it to his neck and a limb of the tree, and to make doubly sure of his suicidal purpose to cheat the law, took his pistol and fired a shot into his brain. Faivre was dead when sheriff Beary and his deputies reached him—it being then about 7 o'clock p. m.

The body was carried to Schriever when deputy coroner Stark held an inquest on Tuesday morning—the verdict being in accordance with the above facts.

It is said that Faivre had made threats against two other parties in Assumption parish—who will be reheaved at news of his death.

Faivre's pistol, a 38 calibre Bulldog, with which he shot himself, was found in the water under the tree where his body was found hanging, the following morning. One chamber of the revolver had been discharged.

### Cost of a President.

A writer for the New York World has figured out that the cost of conducting the presidential campaign from now on will reach a total of \$25,000,000. His estimate includes only expenditures for legitimate purposes, such as orators, and oratory, printing and stationery, the hiring of halls, the organization of parades and other campaign methods to enthrone the masses of the people and win votes.

With such an expenditure as this for a Chief Magistrate the people should certainly chose a statesman who will try to run the government on an economical basis, administer affairs for the general good of the people, and use all honorable means to live at peace with all nations.

### Street Improvements.

We noticed at the meeting, on Thursday evening, a group of our citizens discussing the improvement of our streets, just before the meeting was called to order. Among the number was our worthy Mayor, who, during the past week has had the road grader at work, caris hauling dirt to fill up holes and other laborers opening drains and leveling rough places, who mentioned the necessity of procuring shells to give solidity to our streets.

Mayor Zernott said: Oyster shells can be bought at Houma for three cents a barrel, but the railroad authorities ask \$16.00 per carload to transport them here, a distance of only 18 or 20 miles—which with loading and unloading cars would run up the cost to \$20.00 per carload. It was the opinion of some of the gentlemen that cheaper rates might be obtained from the railroad owing to the fact that a large number of carloads would be needed to properly ballast our principal streets.

This important street measure will doubtless be fully discussed at the meeting next Friday evening.
