The Liberty Congress of the American League of anti-Imperialists indorsed the Bryan and Stevenson ticket and condemned the McKinley administration before adjourning their convention at Indianapolis, on the 16th inst.

Business Men Meet.

Pursuant to a previous call quite a number of our citizens assembled at the City Hall on Thursday evening to consider the expediency of organizing a "Business League" for the promotion of new enterprises and industries in our city.

Thos. A. Badeaux, of our local bar, explained the object of the meeting and in terse and practical words pointed out the needs of Thibodaux in such enterprises as should and could be established by united action of business men and public spirited citizens. He referred to the fact of a similar organization—a Board of Trade being organized here some years ago, and said that under its auspices a new impetus was given to the commercial and industrial progress of the town. He noted the fact that every enterprise—except one—which had been established here in years past, such as two foundries, four boiler shops, a modern brick factory and large ice factory, were all flourishing and employed a number of operatives who spent their earnings in our city. He said there was one serious drawback to the trade of Thibodaux in the existence of so many plantation stores, near town, which practically absorbed the wages of all laborers employed on plantations. To overcome this serious obstacle as far as possible was by the establishment of more industries in our city, which, while increasing the general commerce, would add largely to the local trade through the custom of the many operatives who would be employed in these new industries. Mr. Badeaux enumerated several enterprises which he thought would succeed here, particularly a Central sugar Refinery, a rice mill, a moss factory and a plow factory.

He said the main thing to be done to secure these enterprises was for all the citizens to unite and invest their capital, and invite foreign capital to join in establishing such industries as were demanded and needed here. Space forbids a more extended notice of Mr. Badeaux's most pertinent and practical talk on the necessity of a League or Board of Trade.

On motion, the meeting went into temporary organization—Mr. Thos. A. Badeaux being chosen temporary chairman, and J. M. Taylor, of the SENTINEL, temporary secretary.

On motion of Mr. Sam Blum a committee of three was appointed to draft a Constitution and By Laws. The Chairman appointed the following: Mayor Zernott, Phillip Brand and Sam Blum who will report at the meeting next Friday night.

On motion of Dr. A. J. Meyer the organization is to be called "The Progressive League."

Capt Taylor being called on took the town of Crowley as an example of what unity of action and public spirit could do for the magic development of the resources and industries of a country and establishing needed enterprises. He believed the same thing could be accomplished in Thibodaux if the citizens and business men would only unite their energies and capital and say "we will have all needed enterprises for the upbuilding of our city."

On motion meeting adjourned to meet again—for permanent organization—at the city Hall on next Friday evening, the 24th inst, at 8 o'clock p. m.

Chinese Situation.

The latest news from China up to the hour of going to press, summarized is thus: Li Hung Chang makes an appeal for an armistice, pending a settlement between the Imperial government and the Allied Powers, but there will be no cessation of hostilities until the legationers are safely delivered to the allies at the gates of Peking.

The Chinese troops suffered a heavy defeat at Tang Chan, Sunday, and the allies marched direct on Peking, capturing the latter city on Monday. The capture of Peking and relief of legationers, needs confirmation.
