For Bryan.

Chicago' August 17.—Dr. Henry Wade Rogers, gold Democrat former president of the Northwestern University, and recently called by the faculty of Yale, says that he will vote for Bryan and Stevenson. In 1896 he voted for McKinley and Hobart. He declared also that he believes the gold Democrats as a body will support Bryan this year because they believe imperialism is the most dangerous policy they could adopt, and that the party that is responsible for such a policy should be defeated.

Dr. Rogers says also that the silver plank in the Democratic platform will no more drive them from supporting Bryan than the protective plank in the Republican platform kept them from voting for McKinley four years ago, when silver was the paramount issue.

Ex. Secretary of State, Caleb Powers of Kentucky, who has been on trial for several weeks in that state, charged as an accessory before the fact in the assassination of Gov. Goebel in January last, has been found guilty by the jury and sentenced to the penitentiary for life. His attorneys have applied for a new trial and if denied by the court, it is understood an appeal will be taken to the Supreme Court.
