"Strippings" For Run-Down persons.

The last part of the milking, or the "strippings" taken immediately after milking before it has parted with any of the animal heat, is the most valuable thing known to build up a person who is thin and emaciated from any disease.

I have known of many cases who could not drink the cold milk, or even milk which had stood for an hour or two, and yet these persons could drink a quart immediately after milking without the slightest derangement of the digestive organs.

It should be remembered that it is very important to select a cow that is healthy and one that gives very rich milk. Then it is also of very great importance that the very last of the milking, or "strippings," should be taken of equal importance that this should be taken immediately after milking while it contains all the animal heat.

Of course in most cases a certain amount of medical treatment is also necessary.—Dr. B. J. Kendall, in Prairie Farmer.

Newspaper Law

The following newspaper law is for the protection of the publishers of Louisiana:

- 1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary are considered as wishing to continue their subscriptions. 2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their periodicals, the publisher may continue to send them until all arrearages are paid. 3. If subscribers neglect to take their periodicals from the office to which they are directed, they are held responsible until they have settled the bills and ordered them discontinued. 4. If subscribers move to another place without informing the publisher and the papers are sent to the former direction, they are held responsible. 5. The courts have decided that refusing to take the periodicals from the office or removing and leaving them unclaimed for is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud. 6. Any person who receives a newspaper and makes use of it whether he has ordered it or not is held in law to be a subscriber. 7. If subscribers pay in advance they are bound to give notice to the publisher at the end of their time if they do not wish to continue taking it; otherwise the publisher is authorized to continue sending it and the subscriber will be responsible until an express notice, with payment of all arrears are sent to the publisher.

ORDINANCE NO. 223.

Levying a special tax for the year Nineteen hundred and one on all property situated in the parish of Lafourche subject to taxation under the Constitution of 1898.

- Section No. 1. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of Lafourche in regular meeting assembled, that an ad-valorem tax of ten mills on the dollar be and is hereby levied for the current year Nineteen hundred and one, on all property situated in the Parish of Lafourche, Louisiana, not exempt from taxation under the Constitution of 1898. Sec. 2. Be it ordained etc., That the said tax when collected shall be apportioned and set apart, as follows: First, six mills shall be set apart to pay the current expenses of the parish including the salaries of Parish officers, and shall be known as the General Fund. Second, two and one half mills shall be set apart and used for the maintenance of the Public Schools of the Parish, and shall be known as the Public School Teachers Fund. Third, one half of a mill shall be set apart and used only for the purpose of building, improving and repairing the school houses belonging to the parish and paying the salary of the superintendent and such incidentals as may be necessary under an economic management, and the same shall be known as the Public School House Fund. The Public School and the Public School House Funds shall be subject to the legal order of the School Board of the Parish, and a statement clearly showing the drainage purposes as stipulated by Ordinance No. 192 adopted March 7th, 1898, and the Revised Ordinance of this Parish Section 71, Adopted January the 12th 1899, and the same shall be apportioned and expended as therein provided. Section No. 3. Be it ordained etc., That this Ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage. Adopted Sept. 12, 1900. H. N. COLLOS, J. L. AUCOIN, Clerk, President.

AN ORDINANCE TO PROTECT GAME FOR THE CITIZENS OF THE PARISH OF LAFOURCHE.

Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of Lafourche: Sec. 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person, or persons to ship out of the Parish of Lafourche, for the purpose of selling same any game that may have been killed in the limits of the Parish of Lafourche, under a penalty of \$25 dollars for each infraction of this Ordinance, half to go to the informer provided, that this Ordinance shall not apply to the game killed in the Tenth Ward of the Parish. Sec. 2. That this Ordinance shall take effect from and after its promulgation in the official Journal. Adopted Sept. 13, 1900. H. N. COLLOS, J. L. AUCOIN, Clerk, President.

Proposed Amendment.

Act. No. 73. House Bill No. 73.—By Mr. B. T. Young: JOINT RESOLUTION. Proposing an Amendment to Article 93 of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana.

Section One. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, two-thirds of all members elected to each House concurring, That Article Three Hundred and Three of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana be so amended as to read as follows: Article 303. A pension not to exceed Eight (\$8) Dollars per month shall be allowed to each Confederate soldier or sailor veteran, who possesses all of the following qualifications: 1st. He shall have served honorably from the date of his enlistment until the close of the late Civil War, or until he was discharged or paroled, in some military organization regularly mustered into the Army or Navy of the Confederate States, and shall have remained true to the Confederate States until the surrender. 2nd. He shall be in indigent circumstances, and unable to earn a livelihood by his own labor or skill. 3rd. He shall not be salaried or otherwise provided for by the State of Louisiana, or by any other State or Government.

In case he enlisted in any organization mustered into said service as a Louisiana organization, or in case at the date of his enlistment he resided in the State of Louisiana, he shall have resided in this State for at least five years prior to his application for pension. In case he resided elsewhere than in this State, and enlisted in an organization not mustered in from Louisiana, or in the Navy of the Confederate States, he shall have resided in this State for at least fifteen years prior to his application for such pension. A like pension shall be granted to the widow who shall not have married again, in indigent circumstances, of such soldier or sailor whose marriage to her was contracted prior to January 1st 1870, provided, that if her deceased husband served in an organization mustered in from Louisiana, or if he resided in Louisiana at the date of his enlistment, and has so resided for one year prior thereto, then in order that such widow shall be entitled to the pension as herein provided, she shall have resided in this State for at least five years prior to her application therefor; and if her deceased husband enlisted elsewhere than in Louisiana, and served in an organization not mustered in from Louisiana such widow shall, in order to entitle her to pension as herein provided, have resided, in this State for not less than fifteen years prior to her application for such pension; whether veterans or to widows, shall be allowed only from the date of application under this article, and the total appropriations for all pensions shall not be less than fifty thousand dollars nor more than seventy-five thousand dollars in any one year, provided that nothing in this article shall be construed so as to prohibit the General Assembly from providing artificial limbs to disabled Confederate soldiers or sailors. Section 2. Be it further enacted, etc., That this proposed amendment be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Louisiana for adoption or rejection, at the Congressional election to be held in November, 1900.
