Newspaper Law. The following newspaper law is for the protection of the publishers of Louisiana:

1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary are considered as wishing to continue their subscriptions.

2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their periodicals, the publisher may continue to send them until all arrearages are paid.

3. If subscribers neglect refuse to take periodicals from the office to which they are directed, they are held responsible until they have settled the bills and ordered them discontinued.

4. If subscribers move to another place without informing the publishers and the papers are sent to the former address, they are held responsible.

5. The courts have decided that "refusing to take the periodicals from the office or removing and leaving them uncollected for is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud."

6. Any person who receives a newspaper and makes use of it whether he has ordered it or not is held in law to be a subscriber.

7. If subscribers pay in advance they are bound to give notice to the publisher at the end of their time if they do not wish to continue taking it; otherwise the publisher is authorized to continue sending it and the subscriber will be responsible until an express notice, with payment of all arrears are sent to the publisher.

Election Proclamation. STATE OF LOUISIANA—PARISH OF LAFOURCHE.

In accordance with the law and in pursuance of the proclamation of His Excellency W. W. Heard, Governor of the State of Louisiana, an election will be held in the Parish of Lafourche at the Polling Precincts mentioned below on Tuesday, the 6th day of November, 1900, from 7 o'clock a. m. until 6 o'clock p. m. for the purpose of electing 3 electors to represent the State of Louisiana in the next Electoral College and one Congressman to represent the 1st Congressional District of Louisiana in the 56th Congress of the United States.

Proposed Amendment. Act. No. 73. House Bill No. 73—By Mr. B. T. Young: JOINT RESOLUTION.

Section One. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, that the Constitution of the State of Louisiana be amended so that Article 308 of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana be amended as follows: Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to ship out of the Parish of Lafourche, for the purpose of selling same any arms or munitions that have been killed in the limits of the Parish of Lafourche, under a penalty of \$25 dollars for each infraction of this Ordinance, but to go to the informant provided, that this Ordinance shall not apply to the game killed in the Tenth Ward of the Parish.

Section 2. That this Ordinance shall take effect from and after its promulgation in the official Journal. Adopted Sept. 13, 1900.
