Dwelling Burned. The dwelling house, situated on the Rienzi plantation just across the bayou from town and occupied by Darvillien Boudreaux and family, was entirely destroyed by fire at 12:30 p. m. on last Sunday. Everything points to its being the work of an incendiary.

I looked in the stove and saw the fire was all out. We locked the doors before leaving the house. After mass at the church myself and family went to Maj. Lagardes plantation to spend the day with Francis Falcon, and when we returned home we found our house and its contents in ashes."

Mr. Boudreaux learned from a gentleman who ran to the building while on fire, that the door was standing wide open and that he saw clothing and other articles strewn all over the floor but the fire had gained such headway that he could not enter. This goes to show that some one had broken into the house for the purpose of robbery and after taking what they desired fired the building to cover up the crime. Mr. Boudreaux, among other things, had a new double-barrel shot gun, the barrels nor any of the metal fixtures of which could be found in the ruins as he found the iron parts of the sewing machine. A strong pointer to the house being plundered and set on fire was the fact of a strange tramping looking man trying to seal a double barrel gun to a citizen of town and was clad in a suit similar to one Mr. Boudreaux lost in the fire. The man disappeared however, and at last accounts, had not been apprehended by our officers who were seeking for him.

Victory for Miners.

Philadelphia, Oct. 17.—The great strike of the anthracite mine workers of Pennsylvania, which began Sept. 17, practically ended to-day, when the Philadelphia and Reading Coal and Iron Company and the Lehigh Valley Coal Company agreed to abolish the sliding scale in their respective regions and to grant an advance in wages of 10 per cent net, the advance to remain in operation until April 1, 1901, or thereafter. This action meets the demand of the Scranton miners convention. The decision was arrived at after a conference between the representatives of the individual coal operators and the large coal carrying companies.
