**A Fatal Accident.**

Last Thursday morning Mr. Allan Hebert and Mr. Polyte Thibodeaux, both residents of the Choctaw settlement, drove into Thibodaux in a gig which they left at Mr. Frank Hoffman's shop to be repaired. At about 12 o'clock on the same day Mr. Thibodeaux went to Mr. Hoffman's, had the horse hitched to the gig and was about to get into the vehicle and drive away when Mr Hoffman demanded of him the amount due him for repairing the vehicle. Mr. Thibodeaux, who had been drinking heavily, refused to pay the amount, and it was during his discussion with Mr. Hoffman, who was at that time standing at the side of the horse and directly in front of the wheel of the gig, that he struck the horse a blow which caused it to knock Mr. Hoffman, down injuring him about the face and arm, and to run up Jackson street towards the bridge. At that time Mr. Hebert was on Jackson street on his way to Hoffman's stable. When he saw the horse attached to the gig running up the street towards him he rushed out into the street to stop it and in the attempt was struck a blow just below the heart by the shaft of the vehicle from the effects of which he died forty five minutes later. The deceased was a quiet industrious man, and leaves a grief stricken wife and eleven children to mourn his loss.

**An Old Resident of Lower Lafourche Dead.**

The deceased was highly respected and one of the oldest citizens of that section being at the time of his death 90 years of age.
