To the question: "What is the outlook for the prolongation of human life by twentieth century medical science?" asked of Dr. Rudolph Matas, the distinguished surgeon and professor of Medicine of New Orleans, the following answer was given. "We cannot escape the final tribute that Nature claimed from the organic and organized world—which compels all complex organisms to return inexorably to their primal elements. Integration and disintegration are essential and obligate phenomena in the maintenance and evolution of organic and animal life of this planet." "Dust thou art, to dust returnest" is as much a truism to biology as it is to theology. Life without death is inconceivable to the logical mind. Life and death in a purely material sense are expressions for simple changes in organic states which are as unavoidable as the conclusion that matter and force are indestructible. Apart from this, the mere ability of the future man to retard the inevitable disintegration and to lengthen the normal physiological span of his existence, freed from the pains and torture which now harass the flesh, is more than possible, it is probable."

There are disgusting rumors from Washington to the effect that our government contemplates forcible interference with the government of Venezuela in behalf of a private American corporation. A concession of asphalt deposits had been made by the government of Venezuela to this company. Later the government revoked that concession and made a new one to another American company.

The original concessionaire, arming its employes, defied the government; and in the expectation that the government of Venezuela would attempt to enforce its decrees of revocation, our government is preparing, according to Washington rumors, to support the original concessionaire with the army and navy. Though this story rests upon rumors, there is nothing improbable about it. No one need be surprised, after our imperial experience of the past two years, if the Washington government assumes the function of forcing weak nations to keep in provident contracts with American monopolists. Yet nothing could be more reprehensible. When Americans obtain concessions from foreign powers, they take them at their own peril, knowing full well that reputation, be it immoral or not, is one of the inherent and necessary rights of national sovereignty. To enforce their repudiated claims by making war upon the repudiating country is to make war wantonly in defiance of one of the first principles of international law and of every principle of morality whereby war can be at all justified. Making public war to enforce private contracts or collect private debts is as infamous an excuse for getting glory by slaughtering people as could well be conceived.

Oil Well in Beaumont.

Surpassing the wonderful, is the recent discovery of an oil well in Beaumont, Texas which is estimated by competent judges to give a flow of 16,000 to 40,000 barrels a day. The output is described as reaching a height of 120 feet, and forms a great lake of petroleum around which an embankment has been raised to prevent the stream from spreading in the country around, and a strict guard is maintained to keep this lake from catching fire. It is said that many people—some eminent geologists among them—have long held the belief that there lies under the soil of Texas a large flow of oil which has already been tapped at Cosciana, where the output is about 4000 barrels in a day, and this second tapping at Beaumont would seem to prove the theory, both wells being of about the same depth.
